World Challenge India 2016

Mr Wilcox writes: -

At the start of the summer holiday an intrepid team of seventeen year 12 students flew out to India along with three school staff and a leader from World Challenge. We landed in Cochin in the southern state of Kerala and began our adventure by undertaking a six day trek in the Western Ghats around the town on Munnar. The trek was hard work and not without a few hardships but the views from the top of the hills and the sense of achievement at the end of each day made all the effort, and leech attacks, well worth it. After the hard work of trek the team fully deserved a few days rest and relaxation and this was in the form of visiting the Keralan backwaters near Kollam and enjoying a very relaxing day on a Keralan houseboat.

Once fully relaxed we headed off to the town of Haripad in Kerala to visit our project school with the amazing name of Nangiarkulangara. The school was a primary school of around 700 students and our task was to finish off decorating the new dining area to give the students a safe and hygienic area in which to eat their lunches. As well as the basic decorating tasks of painting and helping to tile the dining room floor we also decorated the play area the students use at break time, one of the classrooms to help make it a brighter and more pleasant place to have lessons in and added some amazing murals to the classroom and dining area. As well as the manual labour of renovating parts of the school the students also visited some lessons and had a go at teaching English classes, playing games



with the school children and getting to know a bit about their lives. After a hard day's work on one day we tuk-tuk'd to the outskirts of the town to visit some of the school children's homes and families. It was fascinating to visit their homes and to see how they live and how different it is to our lives back home and we were all touched by the warm welcome and cups of tea we were offered by all the families. On the last day of project we were invited to a celebratory opening ceremony for the new dining hall. This involved the team getting dressed up in traditional clothing and a ceremony of speeches, songs and traditional dancing. This bought it home to us just how welcome our visit was and how pleased they were with their new dining area.

After the hard work of project the rest of the trip was spent sampling the culture of India. This included flying up to Rajasthan and visiting sights such as the Amber Fort and Jantar Mantar in Jaipur and Agra Fort in Agra. The trip ended with a visit to the Taj Mahal and an elephant sanctuary. The Taj Mahal was an epic sight to see and the photos we had seen previously just didn't do the beauty and scale of the building justice. The elephant sanctuary was set up to rescue elephants from being misused. There are over 2,000 elephants in captivity in India and many are used for tourism, entertainment and begging and the charity was set up to rescue those elephants which were being mistreated and to try to educate the handlers, their families and the wider community. Whilst there we learnt about the elephants' individual stories and had the chance to wash and feed the elephants. The visit was fascinating and gave us an insight into the good work the charity (www.wildlifesos.org) is doing. It was an amazing end to a wonderful trip full of the sights, sounds, smells(!) and tastes which make up the assault on the senses which is a trip to India!



Cameron Toogood wins Arkwright scholarship

Cameron Toogood of year 12 has been awarded an **Arkwright Engineering Scholarship** for two years, commencing in September. He will receive his award at a special ceremony in London in October. Mr Treen, Curriculum Leader of Design Technology, said "This is a fantastic achievement by Cameron in receiving this award which rewards his hard work over the past five years in Design & Technology."

Cameron's sponsor for this award is The Nuclear Institute.

To achieve the award, students are required to complete a detailed application form, sit an aptitude exam and if successful attend an interview.

The Arkwright Scholarships Trust administers one of the most prestigious scholarship schemes in the UK. They nurture future leaders in engineering and related areas of design.

Their Engineering Scholarships support students through their A Levels and encourage students to pursue engineering or related areas of design at university or through a high quality apprenticeship and to take up careers in the field.

News from the sixth form

A lot has gone on since the July edition of Sackville News. A major new initiative this year was to get all year 12 students a work experience placement at the end of the year. We feel that such experience is vital in helping students develop the 'softer' skills so valued in the world of work, to go along with the excellent exam grades they achieve at Sackville!

Mrs Valentine, who organises work experience, asked Anna Davison (right, below) to share what she got from it.

Y12 Work Experience Report

Anna Davison writes:-

In the week just before the summer holidays, the year 12 students completed a week's work experience in a variety of roles and locations. I chose to spend my week at the Laboratory of Apiculture and Social Insects, a research unit of Sussex University which focuses mainly on bees. I didn't know what to expect, having only basic knowledge of insects, let alone bees, but the PhD students took me under their wing and taught me so much about the work they are doing.

From the moment I walked into the lab what struck me most was how passionate everyone was about their work and how eager they were to teach me. I ended up getting involved in all manner of projects: hand pollinating foxgloves; recording and analysing honeybee foraging footage; and conducting field surveys of butterflies. An ever present task was to help decode footage of the



honeybee's waggle dance for a PhD project. The dances are fascinating and are designed to tell other bees in the hive where good food sources are. The dances are recorded, then analysed on computers and can then be layered on maps to show where the bees are foraging; a technique which has various applications for their conservation.

My time at LASI was an intense learning experience and, although I will never love bees as much as the people I have met, I have definitely gained a better understanding and appreciation of them. Helping to overcome the complexities of setting up, conducting and writing up about various research projects has also solidified my desire to work as a conservation researcher. I am sure that the time I have spent in and around the labs here will make all the difference in the future.

Calling all festival goers

Meanwhile some sixth form students have already got their business ideas off the ground. Rosie Hooper, Siam Tongsam and Freddie Webb are part of the team behind the 'Wash Wizard' which allows festival goers to wash when there is no water.

You can see from the attached article how it works, and how successful it has been. The Reading Festival was a more fragrant place this summer I am told.

The bistro gets a makeover

At the end of the summer term, a dedicated team of year 12 students under the unstinting direction of Miss Bach redecorated the bistro.

The students chose a painting by Van Gogh and adapted it to decorate one wall of the room after they had completely refurnished the rest of the area. It now provides a relaxing and colourful place to be. Not only were they able to demonstrate their artistic talents but they learnt the important life skills of painting and decorating.

The room was officially opened by headteacher Mr Grant on Friday 16th September who commented: "Students at Sackville have had a long tradition of decorating their social space and this design is arguably one of the best!"

Students Making a Splash!

Four 17 year olds from East Grinstead have just launched a new product 'the Wash Wizard', a sponge designed to help you stay clean when things get dirty and there's no shower about! It's taking off at a rate of knots and here is a Q&A with the young entrepreneurs about their exciting product:

What exactly is Wash Wizard?

Wash Wizard is a small, compact sponge with just the right amount of soap and Aloe Vera and needs just a splash of water to activate. The sponge lathers up and enables you to wash all-over, and as they only contain natural ingredients there is no need to fine.

Who came up with the idea?

Rosie Hooper, Sol O'driscoll, Siam Tongsom and Freddie Webb, we are four 17 year olds from the East Grinstead area and we came up with the idea for a school GCSE project. We were asked to create a business idea and all of us thought that the sponges were a great idea for keeping clean when there was little wate (and washing facilities) available. We came up with a name and made sure all the domains were free, asked Sol's uncle to come up with a design and briefed the manufacturer. They did a special short run for us at a really good price and we started giving them away for people to try out.

How did the initial idea come up and what happened from there?

Rosie: Originally the sponges were used to wash patients in hospitals, and my mum had a couple lying around the house from ages ago. I thought they would be ideal for festivals or anywhere that you don't have access to a shower really. Because they're so small you can literally take them with you anywhere, just pop it in your pocket or handbag and you're good to go.

What has the feedback been

It's already proven popular at all of the top UK festivuls this summer: Secret Garden Party, the Isle of Wight festival and Glastonbury goers. Feedback has been amazing. Everybody who used them, loved them and wanted more and said we should go on Dragon's Den! The Wash Wizard sponges are now available to buy on Amazon.co.uk as we have such high demand from people wanting to buy them.

We've had fantastic support from our school friends and family who have really helped spread the word and raise awareness via social media. It's been incredible!

Where do you see this going in the future?

We see the business expanding to other sectors such as travellers, sports, kids, even muddy dogs, and being sold internationally. We will be donating a percentage of their sales to various homelessness charities in the UK. Each of us feels passionate about supporting the homeless, and Wash Wizard's donations will be helping towards finding people temporary and long term accommodation, jobs and generally helping people to re-enter society.

At that time, working on a suggestion made originally by Steve Hill, we, his many good friends with his extended family, decided that the best memorial, to a young man so full of life, would be a living memorial.

Contributions were made that provided for a Memorial Cup and Trophy in Adam's name. These are presented to the winning team from an annual football match between the two sixth form colleges in East Grinstead; Sackville, which Adam attended, and Imberhorne which many of his friends attended and where I now work. There were also sufficient funds left to enable us to purchase team strips for each of the participating teams.

Both teams receive commemorative medals each year, all presented by our Town Mayor and the event is increasingly heavily supported by the young people of the Town. It is a very joyous celebration!

Former student Zara Williams

Ex-Sackville pupil Zara Williams recently competed in the World Lifesaving Championships held in the Netherlands from 4th September to 18th September. We are very pleased her dad got in touch with us to give us this news.

In her best event, the 50m manikin carry, she won the race beating a full time professional athlete from New Zealand by 0.01 seconds, to retain her title of World Champion, which she won two years ago in France.

Zara (in the middle of the photo on the next page) still swims competitively for East Grinstead Swimming Club and took up lifesaving with Crawley Town Lifesaving Club in 2010. Since then she has competed for England and Great Britain travelling to South Africa, Australia (twice), Japan, and all over Europe. In 2015 while competing for Great Britain at the European



Championships in Swansea she broke the World Record in her favourite event and also won a silver medal and two bronze medals while representing her country.

She currently holds the titles of World Champion, European Champion, top girl in the Commonwealth and European Record Holder. She holds 7 of the 10 British Records and is overall British Champion. In 2015 she won Sussex Sports Personality of the Year.


