Many of you may be aware that the initial release of the national **school performance tables** took place last Thursday. This year, the government has introduced the new 'Progress 8' measure for schools which gives an overall score for progress from the end of primary school to GCSE. We were delighted to find out that Sackville was **5**th **in West Sussex** and **top in Mid Sussex** (East Grinstead, Cuckfield, Haywards Heath, Burgess Hill and Hassocks) including faith schools. We are also top in the wider area of Mid Sussex plus Oxted, Chailey & Uckfield. Well done everybody!





Success can be evident in many different ways and it has been wonderful to celebrate the achievements of our **U15** (year 10) netball team who won the County Netball League last week! Sackville News teaching and learning update October 2016

Mr Feist writes:-

After the successes of last year, our teaching staff are continuing to work on improving their practice in the classroom with the over-riding aim of providing lessons that meet the individual needs of all of our students.

Our **termly foci of work** this year are the use of Personal Learning Checklists (PLCs) for assessment this term, numeracy across the curriculum in the spring term 2017 and differentiation for SEND students next summer.

So far this term, Mrs Stuart has led our work on using **PLCs** for students to self-assess their progress in each subject. We continue to expand the use of electronic versions of these in Key Stage 5 and in our INSET day last month English, Maths, Science and Drama staff shared how they use PLCs with their Key Stage 4 and Key Stage 3 classes in lessons to check progress and plan differentiated tasks.

Miss Pearson has taken on the **Literacy** Co-ordinator's role and her work is to introduce debating opportunities in the school, support subjects in teaching extended writing skills (which are an increasingly important element of the new GCSEs) and run more reading and writing competitions with the Learning Resource Centre.

In **numeracy** developments, Mr Stromfield and the Maths team are working on consistent approaches to teaching mathematical concepts and processes and finalising our new Numeracy Policy.

Mr Attrill is responsible for **e-learning** and is looking at creating Google 'champions' in each subject area to expand the use of Google Apps in our lessons and he is offering individual training to departments to ensure we also consider how technology can be used to improve our teaching.

Mr Treen is now beginning to get an overview of each subjects' **schemes of work** so we can share best practice in planning between Curriculum Team Leaders.

Earlier this month we ran an 'Open Door' Week where staff visit each other's lessons to see colleagues they wouldn't normally work with and subjects being taught they rarely experience. It is a great chance to share our best ideas and strategies.

We are currently reviewing our provision for our **gifted and more able** students across all subjects, led by Mr Hayden and Mrs Beasley. Lesson observations and work scrutiny will give us a clear picture of what we are doing well and where can improve.


As I write these summaries, I am always surprised by how much we do in a relatively short amount of time! These developments have all happened in the first five weeks of this year and it is a testament to our teachers that they launch into each new term with bags of energy and enthusiasm for the best job in the world.

Sackville E-Safety Advice: Parental Controls

Mr Lea writes:-

What do parental controls do?

These controls are designed to help parents and carers manage their child's online activities. There are various types, some of which are free but others which can be bought. However, nothing is totally foolproof so they don't replace the need for adults to support and advise children using the internet.

This gives you the chance to set up a personalised list of the controls used in your home on all your different devices. There is also advice on how to use all the various controls, with videos and step-by-step instructions.

What can parental controls be used for?

Controls can either be for a device like a games console, or for a network such as your home broadband.

The way to access device controls can vary according to the manufacturer. They can offer varying types of protection, from filtering out adult content from search results to preventing your child from buying things when playing games. You can generally find instructions on how to set up these controls on the manufacturer's website or use the Internet Matters app for help. These settings will apply whether the device is being used in your home our outside – but it's easy for them to be switched off, so talk to your child about trust and responsibility, making sure they understand the importance of why you have put the settings in place.

Most games consoles come with settings, which can be put in place for either the device itself or the games platform. It's easy to forget that games consoles allow players to connect to the internet and talk to people all over the world so setting controls on devices and the platform itself (such as X Box) is important.

Broadband and network filters generally come free with your service. These can be used to prevent material coming into your home. For example, you could restrict anything with a horror or sexual content being accessible via your home broadband. Instructions for accessing these filters can be found on the service providers' websites – look at the bottom of the page to find the "help" or "security" page.

Sixth form physics trip to Geneva

Our ever popular A level physics trip to Geneva to visit the Large Hadron collider began with three bleary eyed teachers and 21 students meeting at 6am in Gatwick. As a reward for our early start, we were greeted with clear skies in Switzerland which lasted for three days. In the afternoon we were shown around the United Nations buildings and were able to observe a session discussion on human rights in the Middle East, as well as visiting other meeting areas in the beautiful old art-deco building.

Students spent the whole day at CERN on Saturday, exploring the impressive interactive multimedia experience in the Globe called "Universe of Particles", and Microcosm, which houses many exhibits from both past and present experiments. After a picnic in the sun, a CERN physicist gave a talk about fundamental particles, which was followed by a tour of the cryogenic testing facility and the ATLAS experiment. It was impressive to think that, on the day we visited, protons were being accelerated under our feet to 99.999999% the speed of light – wow! After an evening meal we ended our day with a walk by the lakeside to see the illuminated Jet d'Eau.



Before flying home on Sunday, we had plenty of time to return to the lakeside and visit the History of Science museum, crammed with fascinating equipment. Even the toilet houses a display case which contains 19th Century colonic irrigation apparatus – a nice touch!

It was great to see students not only deepen their understanding of fundamental physics, but also be inspired by how audacious humankind can be. Thanks to Mrs Rawsthorne and Mrs Sherriff for their company, and to Mrs Wogan, Mrs Baldwin and Mr Wilcox for their hard work planning the trip.

Students from Sackville School and Ashurst Wood Primary School try out Street Snooker in Ashurst Wood

Mrs Leet. Clerk to the Parish Council writes:-

12 of the Sackville year 10 Sports Leaders went along to John Pears Recreation Ground on Tuesday 18th October to try out and find out more about the newly installed Street Snooker Games Wall and is the first of its kind in Sussex!

Ashurst Wood Village Council organised an event for local school children to come and learn about Street Snooker from the inventor and company director of Play Innovation, Marco Boi. Street Snooker is an innovative, interactive activity games wall which combines sport and coordination skills with mental arithmetic and strategic thinking. The Sports Leaders took on the 60 second throwing challenge





with scores ranging from 7 to 24. The girls then challenged the boys to a group game with boys winning.

Street Snooker has been provided by Ashurst Wood Village Council with grants from the Big Lottery, West Sussex County Council and Mid Sussex District Council. It is free for anyone, any age, to just go along and have a go.

HOW TO PLAY

The 60 second challenge: Using any size and shaped ball and a timing device (eg stopwatch on mobile phone)

Step 1: Start on red round spot and throw or kick your ball at the

red triangle. Repeat until you hit the target.

Step 2: Once you have hit the triangle, sprint over to the scoreboard and spin the wheel. It must go round at least once! – What symbol has it landed on?

Step 3: Sprint to the selected ground spot and now aim for one of the round coloured targets. Keep throwing or shooting until you hit a target.

Step 4: Add your points up and start back at step one again. Keep adding your points to see how many you can score in 60 seconds

Soccer players: If you are a sharp shooter wanting to improve your penalty or free kicks, you can play using your own ball. **Netball/basketball players:** You might want to test your precision throwing skills for netball, basketball or rugby whilst burning off some calories with the 'Minute Challenge'.

Tennis players: can use it as a rebound wall to practise aiming and timing.

Year 13 travel and tourism students put on a disco for Estcots

Whilst the year 8 students were returning from the history trip to the Somme, our year 13 travel students organised a disco in Estcots School. The Estcots children fully entered into the spirit of the Halloween themed event.



The Aspire Programme

Launched last week (with pizza) Thursday evening sessions have followed on goal setting, and on how to take the small steps to achieve those goals.
