

Every year Jim Roberts reads an address at our end of year assemblies. Here is what he said this year.

It is good to be here again, having missed out this time last year through being in hospital. I don't intend to make this about me but it has certainly been a different year.

On a wintry evening in November my wife and I were discussing the purchase of a new Christmas tree. I had seen one on the net at a good price and my wife was suggesting when we could go and purchase it for the following weekend which would be the proper church calendar start of advent on 27th November, the fourth Sunday before Christmas.

I was concerned that at 6ft, nearly 2 metres, it might be too large and I showed her how high I thought it would be; then I asked a friend how tall he was and he said 6'1" so I asked him over to where we were sitting and explained our query, and my wife could see how big the tree would stand. The man said he did not celebrate Christmas and how he disliked it. He sounded like Scrooge, with almost a 'Bah Humbug' in his voice.

He explained that his parents had both been teachers who did not have faith or believe and they had never celebrated Christmas or birthdays. So this man and his brothers and sisters had been encouraged to think for themselves and come to their own conclusions.

He went on to say that he had cooked for a large number every year for the last few years at Christmas but this year had decided he was no longer prepared to do it and that was that.

I said nothing more and my wife and I resumed what we were talking about and how we might change our plans and choose a smaller tree. I was left, however, thinking, about the friend, that "He really doesn't have Christmas in his heart" and, for a moment, that left me feeling quite sad.

That was the moment I started to think about this year's end of term. I guessed my phrase "Christmas in your heart" was not likely to be my original thought, although I couldn't remember having heard it before. I looked it up on the net and sure enough there are songs and other references to it. So, it may not be original but I am claiming it for now. What I want is that we will all have the spirit of Christmas, that peace and goodwill, some genuine love in our hearts.

My message is for everyone in our community here, whatever your background, whatever your beliefs, it isn't about imposing my beliefs or religion on anyone. It is about truly being a member of this community; that means caring about other people, putting others first before you, accepting who and what you are without wishing for something else, being grateful for all you have and not constantly yearning for more.

In our community, we are all pleased to see that school is out and we can have a rest for a couple of weeks. At Christmas there is the extra excitement of looking forward to time with family and friends, special meals, presents, good times to be had and shared. I am as excited as the next person!

My hope, my prayer this year for the whole Sackville community, our community, is that we may all have some Christmas in our hearts – and that means we will be kind to each other, to our friends, to our families; we will be grateful for everything we have and we will say thank you out loud and we will mean it; we will enjoy it all without moaning about the cost or the worry or the work involved.

A man on the radio the other day said "If you haven't got the spirit of Christmas in your heart you won't find it under a tree." -1 think he is right.

May I wish each and every one of you a peaceful, joyful, happy and blessed time and may it be filled with love and Christmas in your hearts. Happy Christmas.

eSafety advice from Mr Lea

Apps

Apps are small, specialised software programmes which can be downloaded to a mobile device to carry out a particular function. Young people love to personalise their own devices by downloading apps which carry out fun and useful functions from looking up the weather forecast, to playing games and sharing photos on a social networking site. There really seems to be an app for everything these days!

You can download apps via a 'shop' or 'store' on your mobile device, for example <u>Apple's App Store</u>, <u>Google Play</u> and <u>Windows Store</u>. You are able to download most apps for free and some will be paid-for apps, normally paid for via an online account or charged to your monthly phone bill or to your pay as you go credit.

How can I make sure apps are safe?

It is possible for apps to contain viruses and some smartphones are more prone to malicious apps. Smartphones run on an operating system (much like a computer), the three main ones are Google Android, Apple iOS and Microsoft Windows Phone. Apple and Microsoft approve every app that gets to their store so there is some degree of quality control. Android phones use software that allows developers to produce and upload any app. It is always worth reading reviews of the app on the relevant app store to check that other users have not had problems with it. Installing anti-virus software on your device can also help.

Can I check if the app is age-appropriate?

It is worth checking the age ratings on apps, where available. For Google Play and Windows Store, apps are rated through the <u>PEGI system</u>. On other app stores such as **Apple's App Store** and the **Amazon App** store, app developers provide these age ratings and they are not generally independently rated. You can also look at app reviews online. For example, <u>Common Sense Media's rating system</u> relies on developmental criteria to determine what content is appropriate for which ages.

Mobile phone use

Mr Street has this to add to what Mr Lea has said:-

With Christmas fast approaching and only 10 days before the big man pops down our chimney tops we understand that top of many of our students' Christmas list is a new mobile phone.

With this in mind we have done a lot of work on e-safety this term to ensure our students stay safe online and we have highlighted the risks associated with sexting through assemblies. All students have been given the information card on the right:

When the forecast is for strong southerly winds where will you find a member of our staff? Heading to Ditchling to prepare a windmill for grinding flour. **Narinder Bains** has become a fully qualified member of the milling team.

Miss Bains says 'It is a dream come true. I chanced upon the mill on an open day and decided there and then that it was about time I pursued my dream of being part of a team operating a windmill'

A part of our industrial heritage since about 1703, this windmill has been lovingly restored by a dedicated team of volunteers. Miss Bains, a member of Sackville support staff, is now a weekly volunteer and part of the team that regularly grinds flour. It really has been a school affair. For the first time ever recipes for Oldland Flour are being posted on the mill website. These recipes have been devised with the support of our staff in the Food Technology Department. Mrs Smeaton, Miss Owens and Mrs Beale have offered advice and sampling to help create these recipes. They have helped make history.

Update from Rwanda

Something to contemplate as we enter the festive season. Former Sackville teacher Karen Mundy, who now works for Rwanda Aid, updates us on Innocent, for whom the school community raised money three years ago.



It's 3 years since I visited Sackville to do a talk about Innocent, to which the school community responded so generously. I was fortunate enough to see him recently whilst doing some farm training follow-up. He has just finished his exams and will start his final year of secondary school in January, sitting his A levels in November 2017. He is studying Maths, Economics, Business Entrepreneurship and Computing. I am unsure how Computing is taught in a community with no electricity, but from the lesson I observed a few years ago, the teacher had one small laptop and showed the class the functions available on the computer. The charge went on the laptop 15 minutes into the lesson...

Innocent is now living in a small house in the centre of the village. The person who owns the house has kindly let him live there for free. It's far from ideal, with the roof leaking whenever it rains, which is most days at the moment. He has covered the walls in old newspaper in an attempt to insulate the room and make it lighter. Despite the vast challenges in his life, Innocent remains positive and always has a big smile on his face. He was wearing his fleece and 'Mr Happy' t-shirt that we bought him 3 years ago: looking rather shabby these days, but good to know he still has it.

He is working during the holidays by carrying cement where classrooms are being built. He earns £5 a week, which is much better than the £3 a month he was earning by cutting grass. Life still remains a struggle and the next step is to have a good plan for when he finishes secondary school. I'm unsure if he'll make the grades for University, but you never know....

He'll spend Christmas in the village, not with his mum who still lives a few valleys away (about 5-6 hours strenuous walking each way). I really hope to meet his mum one day, but the road is too bad at the moment for the motorbike. The older Rwandan generation really have seen as bad as life can ever get.
