Dear Parents

This is proving to be a busy and fruitful term when we continue to sharpen our practice and plan the best learning experiences for our students as we can. On Thursday 30th January we had an excellent **staff training day** focusing on teaching in our classrooms and how best we can maximise the quality and effectiveness of the learning experience. Teams of Sackville staff have been working on key aspects of this since September, including questioning, feedback, meeting different needs and literacy. These staff led workshops which were both inspiring and creative. Indeed, one member of staff commented afterwards:



"I just want to say how

useful I found today. I think it was the best INSET day I've had since starting at Sackville, so thank you to all who ran the workshops. I picked up some great ideas."

Staff, a representative sample of students and the Governors' Curriculum Committee are evaluating the impact of this training by assessing 'before and after'. All have teaching and learning logbooks for the collection of ideas and the recording of impact. The outcomes are sure to be interesting and will build on the 'Sackville Standards' described in the last issue of Sackville News. A further programme of targeted whole staff training sessions is being put together to ensure that developments are embedded.

It has been good to welcome more **parents of prospective students** to the school this term. Many Year 5 families are looking at what we have to offer as they begin their preparations for choosing a secondary school. One such parent recently commented:

"Thanks so much for arranging our tour of Sackville today, we thoroughly enjoyed it, it's a really lovely school. Please pass on our thanks to the 2 students who showed us around, they were lovely and did a great job; they should be proud of themselves."

It has been so good to meet more of you as the **parents evening** cycle reaches full swing at this time of the year. The Year 9 and Year 13 evenings with subject teachers had a definite buzz of positivity which was great to see.

I am delighted to report some great achievements outside the classroom over the past two weeks. On the weekend of the 1 st/2 nd February, Sackville submitted no fewer than 11 teams for the **Charlton Chase Elite Night Navigation event**, set on the South Downs near Chichester. In this rigorous activity, two of our teams came in **both first and second place**, which was magnificent! They were competing against a very large number of teams, many of which were from private schools, and they did themselves and Sackville proud. Details of this appear later in Sackville News.



In addition to this, one of our year 12 students, Henry Rogers, has reached the **final of the Gatwick Diamond Start Up Talent competition** with his Blacksmith Business—a great achievement.

No less than **53 of our Year 9 students** received special certificates and a Celebration Breakfast on Monday 10th February in recognition of excellent attitudes to learning during the Autumn Term. It was a real pleasure to share this success with them. There is more on this later in Sackville News.

This term has seen some **staffing updates** related to maternity cover and senior internal appointments.

We are delighted to have been joined by **Miss Dalby** this term, who will be teaching **Miss Lloyd's** Languages classes when she commences her maternity leave at half term. This overlap has been of great help to ensure that there is a smooth transition for the students at an important time in the school year.

We welcomed **Mrs Richards** back from maternity leave this month to resume her responsibility as Head of Girls' PE. Very grateful thanks go to **Miss Jones** and **Mrs Sands** for running the department so well over the past few months – they have done a great job and will continue to make their valuable contribution to the life of the school.

Mrs Leeves returned from maternity leave last month to re-join the English and Drama departments – we are very pleased to have her back with us.

Mrs Thomas, one of our Learning Support Assistants who contributed a great deal towards the development of literacy, left us for pastures new at the end of last term and we have three Learning Support Assistants commencing with us this term:

Miss Taylor, Mr Grosselle and Mrs Roth.

Changes are afoot for the senior leadership structure of the school as well. I am excited to announce the appointment of **Mrs Beeney** who will be working with the Senior Leadership Team on many key aspects of school leadership and management. Mrs Beeney has extensive experience as a Head of Maths, as a Director of Year 11 and as an Assistant Headteacher and, I believe, will be a real asset to Sackville. She lives locally and both of her children attended this school. I have worked with Mrs Beeney in the past and know well her high standards and dedication to increasing the life chances of young people.



I am also pleased to announce that, following a rigorous interview process involving many of our staff and governors, two of our current senior staff will assume roles as **Deputy Headteachers** from Easter. They will work alongside

Leading Space Education - Crawley Down visit

We were recently delighted to welcome around 60 pupils and their parents from Crawley Down Primary School who were learning about the Earth in space. After discovering just how far away the moon really is, they used marbles, flour and coffee powder to investigate what factors affect the shape and size of craters. They compared these with those on the moon, spotting similarities and differences. The children were even able to hold a real piece of the moon!

Finally, pupils were shown our observatory and learnt how the dome and telescope move together to view the stars and planets. Here are some of their comments:



33rd annual Charlton Chase elite night navigation event – 1/2rd February 2014

'When the going gets tough, the tough of Sackville get going!'

The 2014 Charlton Chase Elite Night Navigation event, set on the South Downs at Seaford College near Chichester on the night of $1^{st}/2^{nd}$ February, saw eleven Sackville teams competing in a field of over 100 teams, many of which were from private schools.

The incessant rain of late ensured that the ground conditions encountered by the 44 Sackville students were particularly treacherous. Underfoot, paths were cratered with puddles and awash with thick mud. The arduous nature of the event, difficult terrain, weather, (cold with rain showers) combined with tiredness caused numerous other teams to retire, but Sackville were not ones to give up!

The event was, as always, both physically and mentally demanding and the teams of 4 (aged between 15 and 21) walked for over 8 hours, 'criss-crossing' the Downs between checkpoints, where a variety of challenges were undertaken and points gained. No two routes were the same and teams walked at least 25km and far further if they made errors in navigation in their search for manned and un-manned check points and markers.

Throughout Saturday night and Sunday morning, managers were kept up to date with the progress of every team as information, radioed from checkpoints, was entered onto computer and projected onto the wall of the main hall of the college. As daylight broke, ten of the eleven Sackville teams

returned to the college under 'their own steam', tired but triumphant, despite being covered in mud and having very sore feet. Upon their return, all walkers were treated to a full cooked breakfast.

In the Novice (non-competitive) event there were 14 young teams, each supervised by an adult. The three Sackville novice teams accompanied by Miss Jakubowska, Mr Johnson and Mr Wilcox all completed the event, put in good first time performances and are keen to return next year.

As Sackville teams in the Standard event returned in the early hours of Sunday morning it became apparent that many had performed well. Gradually, it became clear that a dwindling number of other teams still walking and yet to return to Seaford College were likely to incur significant time penalties and a Sackville win began to appear more and more likely. However, it wasn't until the very last teams checked-in, that it became apparent that the Sackville 'D' team of Kieran Barnes, George Crawley, Nick Humphries and Thomas Marrable had won the event, with the Sackville 'B' team of Michael Clements, Scott Latham, Jake Griffiths-Ellis and Rohan Pritchard coming second — an incredible achievement!

This is the 4th time Sackville has won the event, the last time being in 2010.
