We are now two weeks into the term and I would like to thank everyone for the excellent start to the year. Students have returned from the holidays with a very positive attitude to learning, looking smart and with the polite and respectful approach for which Sackville is well known. I am only too aware of how crucial the role of parents is in all of this and am very grateful for your support.

Sackville Celebrates Fantastic Exam Results

We are delighted to report an **excellent set of GCSE results** this summer, with a sharp rise in headline figures, all of which meet or exceed national averages. Particularly pleasing are the English and Maths results, especially bearing in mind the more rigorous national marking this year.

In Maths, nearly 80% of students achieved a grade C or above – the school's best ever figure – and English were just short of 70%. Consequently, 62% of students have gained at least 5 strong passes including both English and Maths. This compares well to the school's rigorous targets.



There are many outstanding results at the top level, with 7 students achieving at least 5 A*s. Ella Wooding topped the bill with 10 A*s – well done Ella!

These results are a great tribute to the hard work of the students and teachers of Sackville who were so well supported by parents. The school is clearly making fantastic progress and has achieved really high standards with these results.

These are our top performers in terms of both GCSE grades achieved, and the progress made whilst at secondary school ('value added').

Simon Cook, now year 12, has been awarded an Arkwright Engineering Scholarship for two years, commencing in September. He will receive his award at a special Awards Ceremony in London in October. Mr Treen, Curriculum Leader of Design Technology, said "This is a fantastic achievement by Simon in receiving this award which was reflected in his hard work over the past five years in Design & Technology." Simon's sponsor is The Reece Foundation whose mission statement is to Promote manufacturing and support education particularly relating to engineering, maths and physics but also including issues affecting the countryside and other local charities.

Sackville School's World Challenge!

Sackville School's great summer stretched well beyond its great exam results - six thousand miles beyond, in fact!

On the 27th July 15 excited Sackville School students and 3 teachers landed in Sao Paulo, Brazil and set out on a month long expedition. The leader from the World Challenge company soon had them summiting a 1400m mountain on the first day and doing a jungle trek with monkey spotting on the second - an amazing start.

The group then visited the Iguaçu falls, which is split between the Brazilian and Argentinian border. The falls were breath-taking and they




Two nights in hammocks, a boat trip safari, horse riding, and piranha fishing were just some of the exciting activities then awaiting us. The piranhas proved a tasty meal! The 5 day main trek in the Serra De Mantiqueria Mountains of upper Rio De Janeiro state was tough but definitely made the students appreciate the luxuries of home. After two days of trekking through two stunning national parks, the

group ended up at the village of Campina where they camped for the project phase. A lovely local family looked after them for five days and the students helped to

renovate and repair the mud walls of a house in the local village using local techniques.

The last part of the journey was to the city of Rio de Janeiro - the perfect end to the trip enjoying the Copacabana beach, and seeing the spectacular views from Sugarloaf Mountain and Christ the Redeemer.





Izzy Turnbull commented: "I think the best part about world challenge is not just seeing the country but the fact that you are pushed to, as a group, organise the trip yourselves, in the way of transport and accommodation. It seems challenging at first, but it really develops you as a person and your independence. I would say that going on world challenge was one of the best and most fulfilling experiences of my life; not only has it given me a taste of a different culture, but has given me a desire to travel more. I would highly recommend anyone given the opportunity, to go on world challenge; it's a chance not to be missed."

A-Level Physics Trip to CERN in Geneva

On a cold and wet weekend in September a group of year 13 physics students headed off to the warmth of Geneva to visit CERN, the biggest physics lab in the world and the home of the large hadron collider. On arrival in Geneva we dropped our luggage off at the accommodation and headed off on the amazing tram system to the United Nations. The tour of the United Nations took us round the old and new buildings which house the second largest United Nations building in the world. The tour was very interesting and we got to sit in the main assembly hall where all the delegates from all the countries of the world discuss world politics.

The main purpose of the visit to Geneva was the visit to the CERN labs. We arrived via the trams and started our visit in the "Universe of Particles" exhibit which gave a lot of background information regarding CERN, the physics they are researching and how the research is being carried it. It also houses one of the original computers Sir Tim Berners-Lee used as the first World Wide Web server. After lunch we had a tour of the CERN facility. This started in the AMS building where scientists are using equipment on the international space station to research cosmic rays. The second part of our tour was at the CMS detector, which is part of the large hadron collider. The CMS detector is 100m underground so we had to wear hard hats and take a ride in a lift. We started off by being shown around the control room and our guide, who was a CMS physicist, explained to us how CMS smashes particles together and detects the new particles. We then were allowed into the detector cavern to see the detector itself. Usually it would be too dangerous to see the detector but as it's down for maintenance we were lucky enough to be allowed inside. It was fascinating to see the scale of it first-hand and to think that this detector recently discovered what is believed to be the Higgs Boson.



On the Sunday we enjoyed a day walking around the lake front of Lake Geneva. As part of this we visited the History of Science museum which had some fantastic old pieces of scientific equipment as well as some interesting and fun "hands on" exhibits. We also saw the Jet D'Eau which is the world's 3rd highest fountain and we visited the Geneva natural history museum, which was fascinating. Thanks to Mr Coomber, Mrs Morris and Mr Wilcox for making such an entertaining and interesting weekend possible.

News from Drama ...

We had fantastic results in the summer with our GCSE Drama classes achieving 77% A*-C, 31% at A*/A, and our Level 2 BTEC Performing Arts students achieving 100% D*-P! Our Sixth Form also performed well with 67% achieving A*-C overall and a massive 87% A*-C in their fantastic practical exam performances. Well done to all our students - we're so proud of you all!

As always, there will be plenty of opportunities this year to see some of the brilliant practical work that our students produce. Your first opportunity will be on Wednesday 27th November at 6.30pm in Drama Studio 1 when our year 11 GCSE drama classes will be performing their penultimate assessment pieces with pieces including *One Man Two Guvnors* and *The Importance of Being Earnest*.

This year we welcome a few new members of staff to Drama: Miss Welfare is braving year 7 this year and Mr Aaronovitch has made a welcome return for this year too. We also welcome Mr Brasted to the department as he takes over from Mrs Gooding.

Mr Brasted is taking on the successful Lower School Drama Club for years 7, 8 and 9. Details of how to join the club will be appearing before half term in the form of posters and assembly announcements – don't miss your chance to join in!

We are currently investigating a number of options for theatre trips for our key stage 4 and 5 students including *The Woman in Black* and *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night Time* and a trip to a dance show for our dance students. We are also heading to Chequer Mead in October to see Ariel Company Theatre's performance of *Les Miserables* which some of our students will be performing in!

And News from PE ...

U13 RUGBY VERSUS WARDEN PARK: SACKVILLE 0, WARDEN PARK 34

Score lines are deceiving and Sackville dominated for most of the game. Some individuals ran very well with the ball; Jack Howcroft, Ryan Whiteman, Tom Holland and Alex Keeley to name but a few of those individuals.

Sackville suffered an early injury to their No 8 forward Callum Horwood, and Charlie Tabares had to fill in for him. Charlie did this with excellent skill and leadership, picking up at the scrum and loose ball at the ruck gaining Sackville great yardage.

However, even though Sackville played for much of the game in the Warden Park half, they lost the match due to missed tackles. They missed these tackles and poor defence led to the Warden Park players being allowed to run 25 metres before being confronted by a Sackville tackle. Jack Howcroft and Charlie Tabares were outstanding in their defence, leading to Dan Harding stopping some of these runners, but, this was not enough to stop Warden Park from scoring.

Sackville came close to scoring on a number of occasions through Elias Neale and Ollie Roberts getting near their opposition try line.

This was the first game of 15-a-side for Sackville, and with practice they will improve.

UNDER 15 RUGBY V BEACON COUNTY CUP: SACKVILLE 71, BEACON 7

Sackville went with a side with players playing out of their usual positions. This did not stop the team running in 13 tries in a game they completely dominated from start to finish. Rob Ure was able to put Sackville on their way in the first minute with a dummy pass creating a gaping hole for him to run through. This led to an avalanche of tries with Owen Jones running in 4 tries from outside centre and Rob Ure scoring 4 tries from fly half. Kevin Michel scored 2 from No 8.

Joe Middlemiss also scored a brace from second row with Pyong Dimbi, scoring a try from the open side flanker position. Ben De Turris was able to convert 3 of these tries as most of his kicks were from the edge of the pitch. Jake Ayerst was close on two occasions, Niz Islam just knocked on when he was in the clear and Ravi Cryer was unlucky to have a try disallowed for a forward pass.
