## NATIONAL NEWS

### [Office of National Statistics labour market information – August to October 2019](#)

The latest labour market figures were released from ONS last month. The main points are:

- The UK employment rate was estimated at 76.2%, 0.4 percentage points higher than a year earlier but little changed on the previous quarter and broadly flat over the last few quarters.
- The UK unemployment rate was estimated at 3.8%, 0.3 percentage points lower than a year earlier but largely unchanged on the previous quarter.
- The UK economic inactivity rate was estimated at 20.8%, 0.2 percentage points lower than a year earlier but largely unchanged on the previous quarter.
- There were an estimated 794,000 vacancies in the UK for September to November 2019; 20,000 fewer than last quarter and 59,000 fewer than a year earlier.

## [Young people not in Employment, Education or Training \(NEETS\)](#)

These are the quarterly figures for the UK (there is no regional breakdown of this data) from ONS taken from the Labour Force Survey. The headlines are:

- There were 800,000 young people (aged 16 to 24 years) in the UK who were classed as NEET in July to September 2019
- This represents 11.6% of all people this age. Compared to the same period last year, this has gone up in actuals by 42,000 in the last year and the rate has also increased
- 40% (317,000) of the 16-24 years categorised as NEET were looking for, and available for, work and therefore classified as unemployed; the remainder were either not looking for work and/or not available for work and therefore classified as economically inactive.

## [The changing face of Engineering](#)

A number of big business names have joined forces to change the face of Engineering in an attempt to alter perceptions and encourage more people into the sector. As part of this a number of new photos have been released on [flickr](#) as previous images provided a narrow portrayal of the profession. Research shows that many young people and sometimes parents are unaware of the role of Engineer and with a UK shortage of up to 59,000 engineers this needs to be addressed.

## [More people applying for Medicine courses](#)

Encouraging news from UCAS with the number of people applying to study to become a doctor as well as dentistry and veterinary courses has risen to 23,710 - a rise of 6% on last year. Just under 70,000 people have applied for under-graduate courses – a four per cent rise on last year.

## [Large Babcock contract will create UK jobs](#)

Babcock International Group PLC have secured a large contract to build a new fleet of frigates for the Royal Navy. Over 2,500 jobs will be created across the country including 150 apprenticeships. The manufacturing will commence in 2021 and finish in 2027.

## [Lidl Supermarket](#)

An article in the Yorkshire Post reports on Lidl supermarket who currently have 770 stores across the UK and a target of 1,000 stores by 2023. The store which has announced a large investment into British food, farming and production over the next five years are also investing in their employees. Entry-level pay is £9.30 per hour (£10.75 in inner London) and going up to £11.70 for loyal employees who remain with the company, depending on location.

## What employers want from their employees

Monster report on the skills which employers say they want their employees to have. Interestingly they would appear to care more about the 'soft skills' and their top five are:

- Dependability/Reliability
- Integrity
- Respect
- Team Player
- Customer-focused

Whilst hard skills can be taught employers favour those who have a natural ability to display these soft skills. Certainly, when we look at online vacancies, customer service skills and an ability to be a team player are often the top skill requirements.

## Support for homeless, ex-offenders and veterans

Only a pavement away aims to act as a conduit to employment to help those struggling to find work in the hospitality, pub and restaurant industry. The charity is based in London and anyone who wishes to make contact with them can do so by completing an [online form](#).

## Improvements to icould website

icould have made some changes to their website which include

- Easier to understand Labour Market Information (LMI) with each video – they have added a question mark symbol in the corner of each dataset for more information.
- The [career paths](#) section now has ten categories: Getting started; Getting a job; Career development; GCSE options; Apprenticeships; A-levels and college; University; Volunteering, travel and gap years; Revision, study and exams; and Wellbeing.

## Barclays LifeSkills programme

Barclays LifeSkills programme is being extended to help millions of adults across the country, with the aim of giving them the skills, knowledge and confidence needed to succeed in the workplace. Free online tools and **resources** including articles, videos and career case studies are available as Barclays launches a drive to boost workplace skills to meet the needs of the UK economy.

## Graduate Outcomes

A report from Prospects using data from the Higher Education Statistics Agency (HESA) on the destination of the graduates of 2016/17, six months after graduating. Some of the findings show:

- the graduate labour market movement is perhaps overplayed as only 18% of graduates moved away from home for university and then moved somewhere else on graduation

- almost 60% of graduates stay to work in the region they studied in
- 45% of graduates are described as 'loyals' - live, study and work in the same region  
They point out that this dispels the myth that all graduates go to London to find work, it also suggests that in careers guidance of people looking at HE, there should be a good understanding of the local labour market. It also adds to the debate of to what extent universities are/should be providing education and skills for the local communities/economies - the idea of the civic university.

The South East of England has the second largest regional economy after London, making it a prime destination for graduates to find employment. It also boasts an employment rate of 79.6% for working age individuals, which is higher than the average for London and the UK overall. Healthcare roles are becoming increasingly popular, with a 13.5% rise in entrants since 2015/16<sup>1</sup>. Graduates in this profession gravitate towards nursing, medical practitioner and midwifery roles. The table below is copied from the report

## South West

For the most-part, graduates working in South West were not drawn in from other areas of the UK. 67.4% were originally domiciled in the South West - the second most common location being the South East at 10.7%. For graduates in the region, health was the most popular industry (19.9%) followed by retail (11.6%) and education (11.1%).

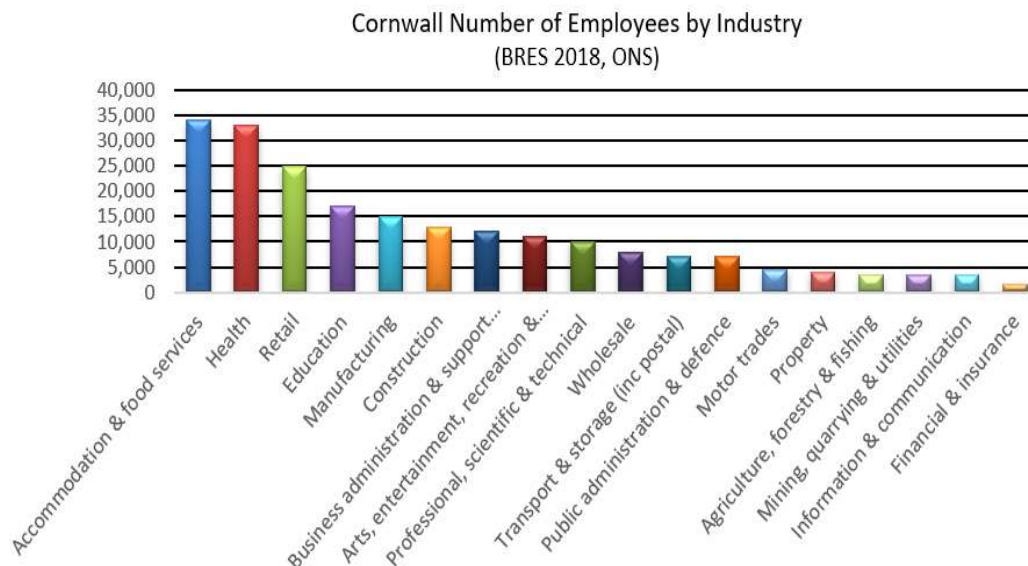
### [Working for Skanska Construction company return to work programme](#)

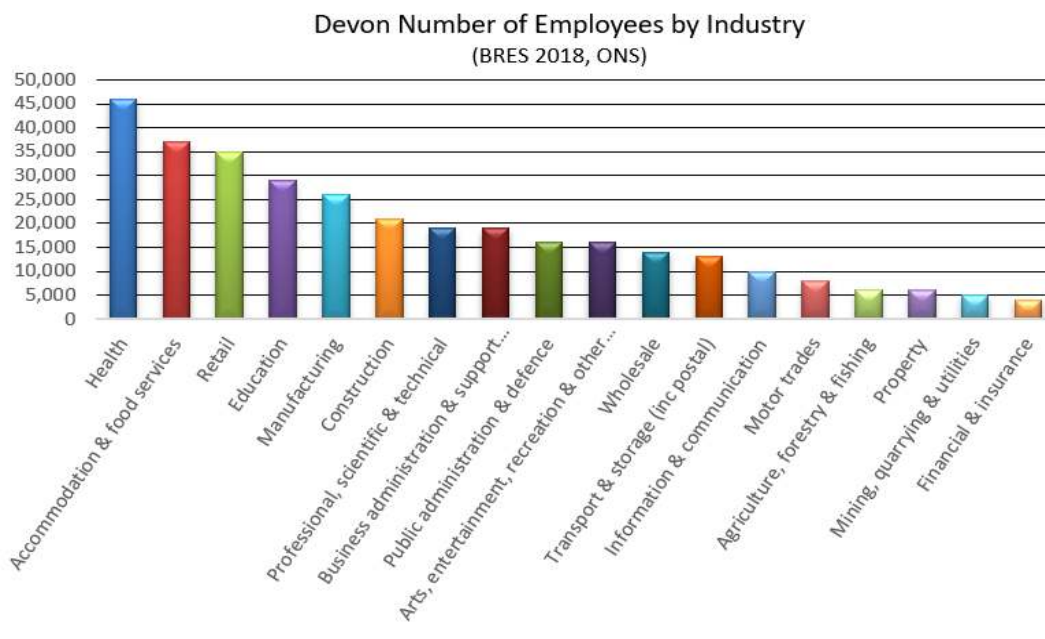
## New Climbing Centre and café for Wadebridge

Rockfish restaurant will create 40 jobs for Poole when it opens on the former Purbeck Pottery site.

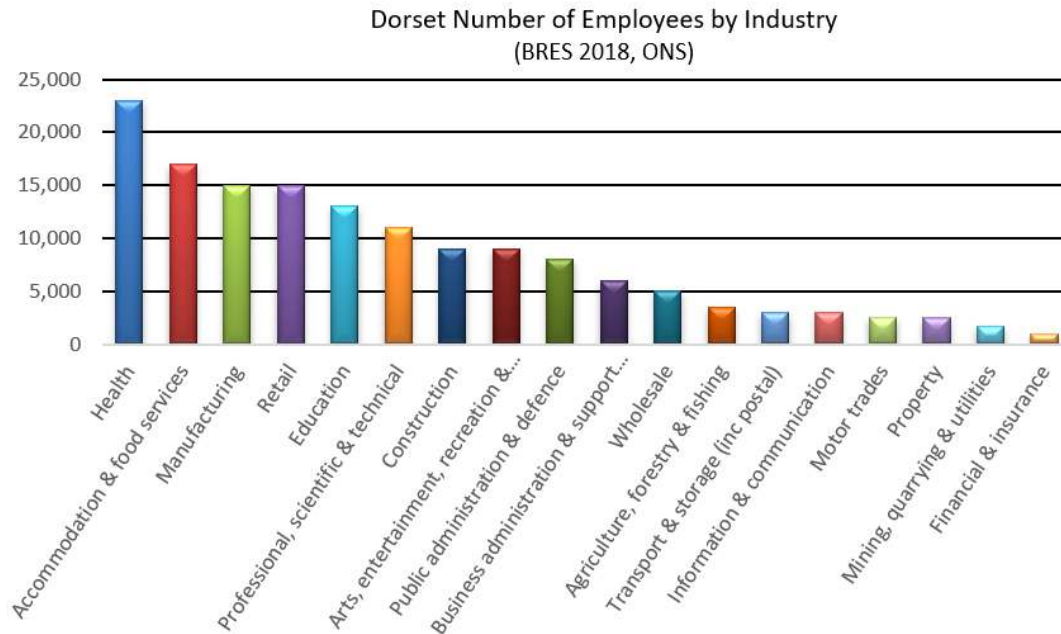
### **Best employers in Dorset**

### Pharmaceutical company Eli Lilly comes to Basing View

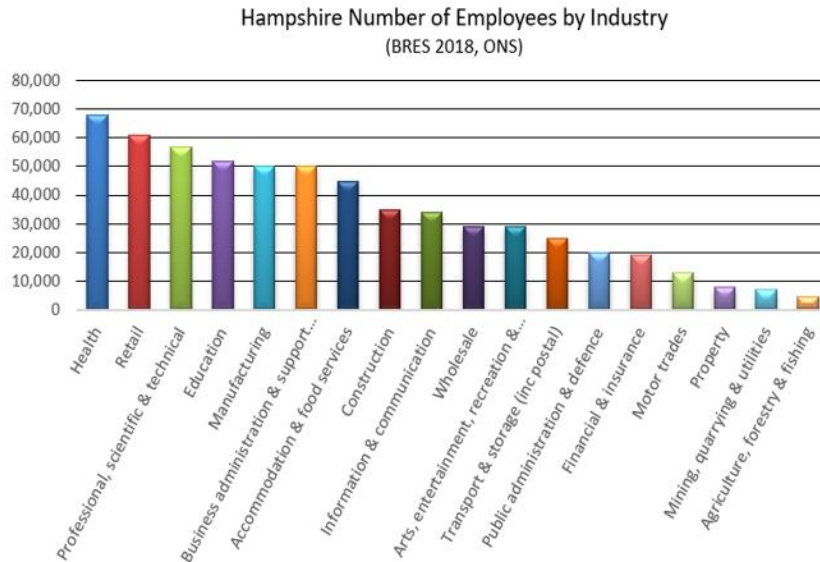

### Basingstoke – just the place for IT professionals

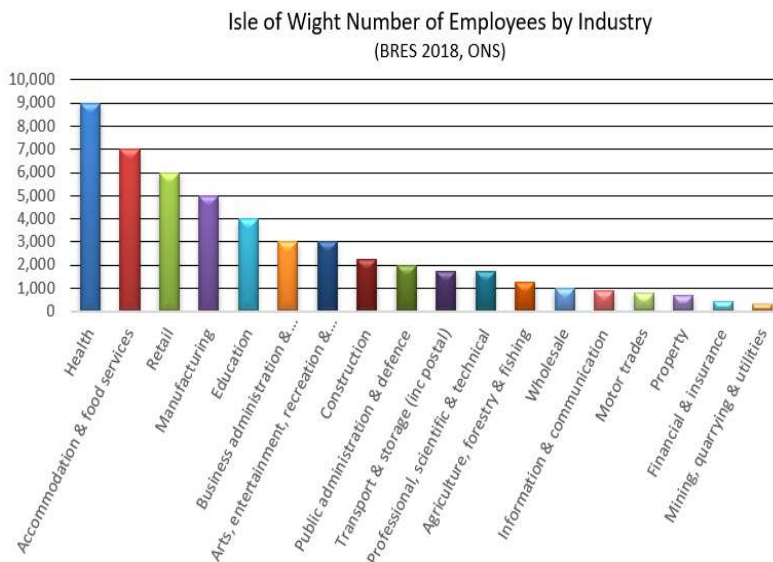

Percival Aviation, based in Segenworth, is expanding and creating 30 new jobs in the process.

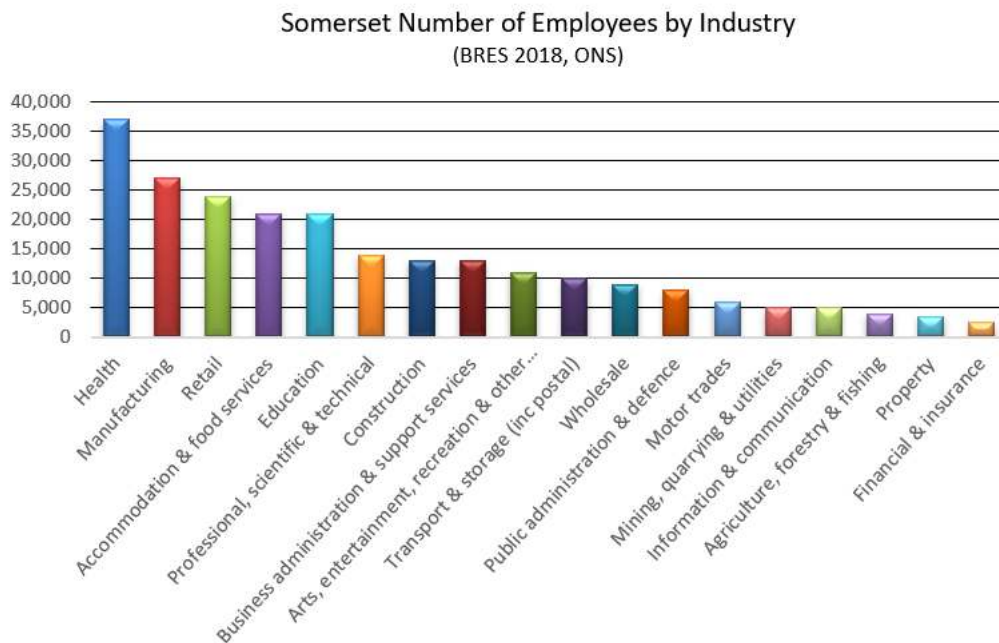

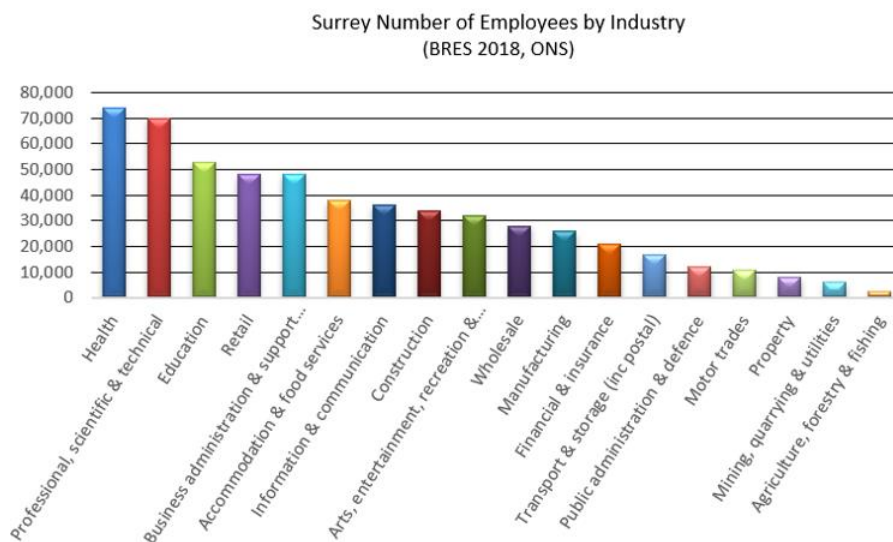
## [Lidl in Chard to create jobs](#)

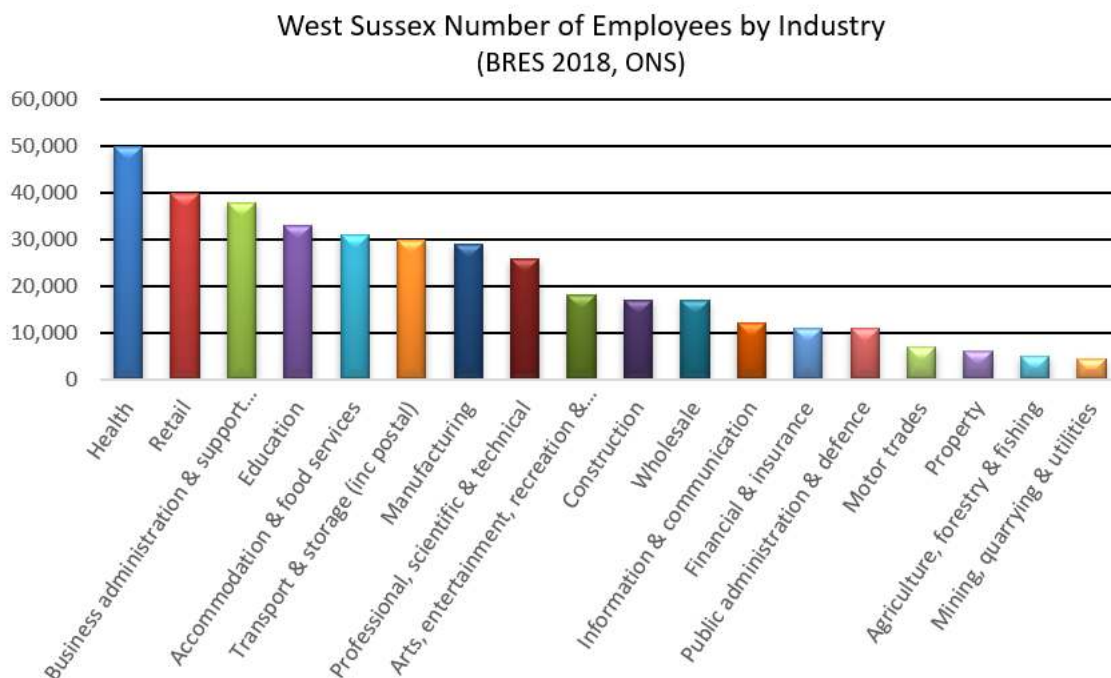
