5 May-Jul	Stuart England	The Stuart Dynasty shows the significance of changing power and control within the Church, monarchy and parliament. Students will be able to: • Explain why the battle for power and control led England into civil war.	SIMILARITY AND DIFFERENCE: Explain why England lost its monarchy?
