Spr 2	World War One	World War One marks the start point of change in the 20th century on both a British and global scale. Sum 1	USA in the 20th century	Following World War One, the USA became a global superpower. Its economy had far-reaching impacts and the Great Depression is a significant historical turning point.	The Great Depression as a focus sets up a new context for the Rise of Hitler in Year 9 and allows for comparisons to be drawn between countries - Second order concept is SIMILARITY AND DIFFERENCE.	Students will be able to:  • Develop a contextual knowledge of the USA, Britain and Germany by drawing on comparisons that sets them up for future learning.	SIMILARITY AND DIFFERENCE: What was the impact of the Great Depression?
Sum 2	The Civil Rights Movement and British Black History	Understanding that there has been a fight for civil rights in the USA and Britain, in the last 100 years, allows students to understand the 21st society they live in. Year 8 reading book: Midnight Without A Moon	Students will need to draw on prior knowledge of the USA topic, enslavement and empire so that they have a contextual understanding of civil rights in the USA and Britain - Second order concept is SOURCES.
