Wednesday started with an inspiring talk from **Simon Boyle**, chef and social entrepreneur. ## Year 10



#### STEMFest 2015

On Tuesday 30th June a number of year 8 students visited STEMFest at the South of England Showground, Ardingly. This event is a day of shows and workshops designed to motivate and engage students from age 9 to 19 interested in STEM, including the regional heats of the National Science & Engineering Competition which recognizes young people's achievements.

Thales has been running an after school project to make a metal detector with 12 year 9 students. The winning team of this project went forward to the final at STEMFest. The students had to make a metal detector with materials provided and then test it on a squared board and record the number of squares that contained metal. They also had a test paper to answer which counted towards the final marks. Congratulations to Michael Hoelters and Wade Marais who won the final, shown below testing their detector.



#### **Brunel Awards 2015**

The Brunel awards are given to students in years 7 and 8 who have worked hard during the year in the STEM subjects (science, technology and maths). They are nominated in one or more of four categories – effort, excellence, creativity and achievement.

The awards ceremony was held on Wednesday 1<sup>st</sup> July and 127 students were nominated this year. Each student received a certificate giving details of their award. Mr Treen, Mr Bush and Miss Hilaly spoke about the two STEM days – Mission to Mars

for year 7 and Disaster Day for year 8 - and the activities undertaken on those days. Miss Hilaly spoke about the two maths challenges for years 7 and 8 being held at the moment — Big Foot and Murder Mystery. Mr Treen also spoke about the opportunities for students in STEM as they progressed through the school and to build on what they had achieved so far.

There were special awards for the two engineers of the year in years 7 and 8 respectively. They were Madeleine Wrigley and Fynn Jones in year 7 and Abigail Bramwell and Adam Stuart in year 8. This year, for the first time, there were two Engineers of the Year as both had achieved so much — Eleanor Canepa-Anson and Jake Wenman, shown here with Mr Grant. All six students received a special trophy and a prize.

- 5. Search for "eBooks" by searching "Online".
- 6. Choose the eBook. Open and download to your device and enjoy the read.
