Dear Parents

We have started the summer term at a strong pace and, first and foremost, I would like to wish our year 11 and sixth form students good luck as the exam season begins. I would also like to wish their parents all the best as it is undoubtedly a team effort! The teaching and support staff have dedicated themselves to preparing the students as thoroughly as possible, including a full range of Easter holiday GCSE revision classes which were well attended. Ms Wernham even took her class to Costas in Lingfield to revise their literature texts! As Headteacher, I cannot ask for more.

Election fever is in the air and I am delighted to report that Sackville's elections for Head Girl, Head Boy and Deputies has gone very smoothly with the new posts for 2017-18 announced in the sixth form assembly this week. Our new Head Girl will be Charlie Main and new Head Boy Tom Dean, with Chloe Maraner and Chris Oglethorpe as Deputies. The remaining Head Team is in the process of being confirmed. I know that these excellent students will continue the fine work of

their predecessors in providing great leadership to the school's student body. We are also currently establishing a range of leadership roles for our year 10 students as they move into year 11.

I am very pleased to inform parents that, for the second year running, Sackville has been awarded 'Leading Edge Status' by the national SSAT. The award reflects strong teaching quality and results and it is a real honour to receive it again. We will therefore be continuing in our professional development work within the school and with others beyond, all of which will benefit our students in their learning experience.

Our sixth form students and parents recently enjoyed a very informative futures evening looking at the university application system and apprenticeship routes. Some students who have recently left the school returned to share their up-to-date experiences of university and the workplace and we enjoyed helpful input from Sussex

University. Decision making at the 16 -19 stage does not get any easier, so such events are really crucial.

Our year 10 students have been actively enjoying trips within this country and abroad over the last month or so. Our year 10 World Challenge group travelled to Sri Lanka at Easter. On arrival, after a night on a beach-front hotel, the group moved on to their project near Kandy where they were based in a local school. There they assisted in some site maintenance, moving several tonnes of stones and bricks, and also worked in the classrooms teaching

English to the students. They were given a fantastic send-off when leaving the school, with a show including a fire-eater. They were also presented with

an enormous hamper of local produce. What a wonderful experience for all! A write up and more pictures appear later in Sackville News.

More recently, a large group of year 10 students undertook their Duke of Edinburgh practice expedition weekend under the excellent leadership of Mr Langford and Mrs Rawsthorne. The students conducted themselves magnificently and prepared well for the summer challenge.













At the end of last term the year 12 geographers spent **five days in Pembrokeshire for their A level fieldwork**. A mixture of human and physical geography was studied, with the students often working late into the evening. Port Talbot was visited on the journey out, and students looked at the importance of regeneration both there, and later around Pembroke and Milford Haven. In between, there were two days studying coastal cliff and dune scenery. There was also time for recreation however, with Ultimate Frisbee being a particular hit. For this, and the excellent organisation of the whole trip, I would like to thank **Mr Attrill**.





On the sporting

front, we are very proud that our boys' **U13 cricket team has been crowned Sussex indoor champions 2017**. This six a side tournament was organised by the Sussex County Cricket Foundation and many schools across Sussex entered. Sackville won its regional matches with wins over Warden Park and Burgess Hill. This meant they qualified for the Sussex finals at the BACA Cricket Centre in Brighton, where they defeated Felpham (a previously unbeaten side) and Durrington. Many congratulations to Joe Sheridan (captain), Caspar Arthur, Olly Ally, Luke Peel, Jake Lingard and Liam Dawes and of course, Mr Watson and Mr Currie! This week, we enjoyed a celebration in my office at morning break.

Sport can indeed be a power for good in many ways and no more so was this seen than in the **memorial football match** held at Sackville

in memory of **Musa Mevlit** who sadly passed away just before the Easter break. Mr Mevlit was a very popular figure in our community, best known for selling ice creams in Bourg-de-Peage Avenue with such a friendly smile day in, day out. Our thoughts

are with his family at this time and it was good to see such a strong turnout of support at the match, together with a great sum of money raised.

Finally, I would like to mention an article that appears later from **Mr Feist**, Deputy Headteacher, about his trip to visit the **Harambee project in Kenya**. Sackville has had a long association with this project and, together with Mr Feist's trip, we have experienced some assemblies this term from the project organisers showing the real benefits our fund raising has brought about. 

World Challenge in Sri-Lanka

For 14 days over the Easter holidays a group of 18 year 10 students enjoyed a life-changing experience travelling round Sri Lanka. This involved **four days working at a rural school painting a classroom** and helping to put up a new fence to keep out wildlife. This was also a great opportunity for the students to interact with the local children and get to know a bit about their lives and culture.



The next phase of the expedition was a **three-day trek**. This included a walk to "World's End", a 800m high cliff edge with a stunning view. The next trek day was a severe physical challenge for the team as they climbed Sri Pada (Adam's Peak), on top of which is the footprint of Buddha when he first arrived on earth. The trek up to the summit involved climbing 5872 concrete steps and took 7 hours in 30°C heat. The team pulled together and performed magnificently to all reach the summit together.

After the hard work of the project and trek the expedition ended with a **few days of culture, rest and relaxation**. This included a visit to the Buddhist temples in Dambulla caves, visiting a tea factory, visiting the Temple of Tooth in Kandy, watching a traditional dance show, climbing Sigiriya Rock, visiting Galle Fort and spending time relaxing by a swimming pool.

By the end the students had learnt a lot about life in Sri Lanka, made new friends, learnt organisational and communication skills, been challenged physically and mentally, had great fun and been a credit to themselves and the school.



STEM news



Sackville students have recently participated in two STEM events organised by Brighton University.

The first was the **Slot Trucks challenge** sponsored by The Institute of Mechanical Engineers (IMechE) and took place at Brighton University on 13th March. Eight students from year 9 took part and competed with 15 other schools in a Slot Car Challenge event. Competitors gained a Bronze level CREST Award for taking part.

The teams, one consisting of four students and the other of three, had four hours to design and build an electric slot car that had to compete under a number of challenges. The engineering challenges were

- The slot car should be capable of carrying a weight up a steep hill
- The slot car should be capable of carrying a trailer and ring a strategically placed bell
- Design work showing team work, design solutions and dimensions.



Marks were awarded for time, course completion, aesthetics and team work. The team consisting of three students were placed joint third. Well done to all who participated and thanks to Mr Martins from D&T department who accompanied the students.



The second event was the **IMechE Schools Robotic Challenge** held on 28th March held at **Ricardo in Shoreham**. Ricardo is a world leading technology and engineering consultancy. Nine year 8 students took part in an exciting and hands-on way by building small remote-controlled robots and taking part in challenges. Sackville students were placed 5th and 6th out of 15 schools.

The challenge, led by **STEM Sussex**, encouraged participants to explore different aspects of engineering whilst developing team working skills. Teams were supported by STEM Ambassadors from Ricardo and the local IMechE Automobile Division. Students and staff also had the opportunity to tour the facilities at Ricardo and were exposed to engineering in practice. Well done to



those students who participated and thanks to Mr Hayden who accompanied them.

Guinness World Record Cross Channel Hot Air Balloon Flight

suits (just in case) and at 7.04am 82 hot air balloons lifted off and sailed slowly out over Dover Castle and Docks and out over the sea - an incredible sight!

The time from take-off to "feet dry" over the coast in France was just about 2 hours, with a total flight time of 2hrs 45min. I am a P.U.T. (Pilot Under Training) and piloted the balloon for over half an hour over the sea.

In the photo on the right you can see our blue balloon leaving Dover, flying low over a ferry.

We are hoping that once all teams have verified their flight tracks a new World Record will stand for 82 balloons crossing the Channel - an increase from 49 balloons in 2011.

The other image shows an overlay of our track from take-off to landing. The colours show height, (red being nearly 3000ft and the green being the lowest of 17ft over the breakwater in Dover docks).

On 7th April I the opportunity to take part in a Guinness World Record attempt to cross the English Channel by **hot air balloon**. I flew with my father, who has a pilot's licence, and his uncle.

The winds had to be light and, of course, in the right direction so we had waited over a month for the right conditions. We set off at 2.30am and arrived at Lydden Hill Race Circuit at 4.15am, setting up our balloon in the pitch darkness. As dawn approached, the pilots met for a final

Our former Community Police Liaison Officer, Lesley Dann, and her husband Roger established the 'Harambee for Kenya' charity in 2007.

Since then they have taken scores of vulnerable (often orphaned) boys who live on the streets of Kissi and Meru in rural Kenya into safety. They clothe and feed them. They commit to raising them as long as the boys complete chores around the safe house to develop life skills and crucially, that they go to school and work hard.

For four years, Mr Latus' final year group (now year 12) sponsored a boy called Carlos through his secondary schooling as only primary education, up to the end of year 8, is paid for by the Kenyan government.

We were therefore delighted this year to hear that Carlos had performed extremely well in his end of school exams and has been offered a place at university. His friend Reuben was also successful. The first boys to leave the streets and get into higher education!

I had the great privilege of travelling out to Kenya this Easter to see the work of Lesley and her team and meet the boys. They were inspirational. Education is not taken for granted and the boys work extremely hard to escape the poverty and harshness of their early childhood.

They could not do this without sponsorship by friends and family of Lesley and the students here at Sackville. Carlos recorded a video message, thanking the students and staff here for their generous support, which Lesley played in assembly on our return to the UK.

Our admin staff have been so touched by the stories that they have decided to change the life of another boy and take part in the sponsorship, another example of the big heart our school has.

Mr Morris's year 7s have also started to sponsor another boy. I met Simon and he spoke so warmly of Sackville's support in his ambition to become Kenya's first astronaut or space engineer!

I am sure it'll be a great relationship that will show our students what life in Africa is like for those children far less fortunate than themselves and hopefully Simon will become another success story for this incredible charity.

Miss Yendell in Madagascar

Mr Feist is not the only member of staff to have been travelling. You may remember Miss Yendell left Sackville at Christmas to travel and take part in conservation activities. Here she writes about her experiences in Madagascar.

Since Christmas I have been taking the opportunity to travel and I am currently volunteering for a marine conservation charity called Blue Ventures in South West Madagascar. The charity has been working for over a decade with volunteers to protect the coral reef in the South West of Madagascar, which has been over-fished for many decades. If this same level of over-fishing and reef damage continues the local people will no longer be able to fish to feed their families and a valuable habitat, the fifth largest coral reef in the world, will have been destroyed. I have been trained to identify important coral reef species and in scientific survey methods so that I can complete underwater surveys (while scuba diving) to monitor the fish and coral populations and health of the reef. This information is then used by the local community to help them to manage the fishing in the local area and ensure the reef and its fish survive into the future.

Some of the highlights of this experience have included seeing lots of shooting stars as there is little artificial light (called "light pollution") here from street lamps, and diving at night when you can see bio-luminescence - algae which glows in the dark. I've also been to visit a Baobab forest (pictured). The Baobab is Madagascar's most well-known tree and holds water in its massive trunk to survive in desert conditions.



For any Sackville students interested in volunteering or working in science, ecology, medicine, charity work or teaching in the future I would highly recommend a volunteering expedition with Blue Ventures as their work covers all of these fields.

Finally she was highly commended with 86% for her monologue about child evacuees in the war. This follows her Distinction with a mark of 93% in her grade 2 LAMDA exam earlier in the year.

Meanwhile, two of our year 8 students were very successful in a recent dance competition held at University of London. **Ella Dean** and **Melissa Smith** competed at the annual **Starpower International World Dance**
