The deadline for completing the Identifying and Investigating Design Possibilities section is Thursday 03 July 2025. Meeting this deadline is essential, as it allows us to mark their work and provide them with valuable feedback before the summer holidays. This feedback will be instrumental in helping them refine their approach and prepare for the subsequent stages of the NEA.

It is also important to address the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools. While AI can be a valuable resource for research and generating ideas, it is paramount that all work submitted for the NEA is your child's own original thought and creation. Students must adhere strictly to the expectations and guidelines provided by their class teacher regarding the appropriate and ethical use of AI. Any misuse or over-reliance on AI that leads to plagiarism will be dealt with according to school policy and could severely impact their NEA grade.

We encourage you to discuss their progress with them and support them in approaching this challenge with dedication and enthusiasm. By working consistently and making the most of every lesson, they will build a strong foundation for their NEA and achieve the grades they deserve.
