

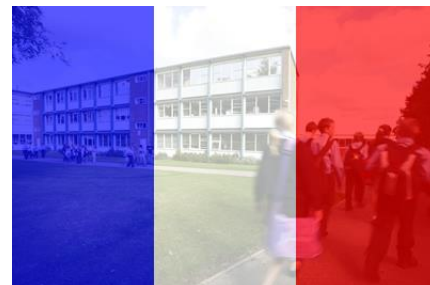

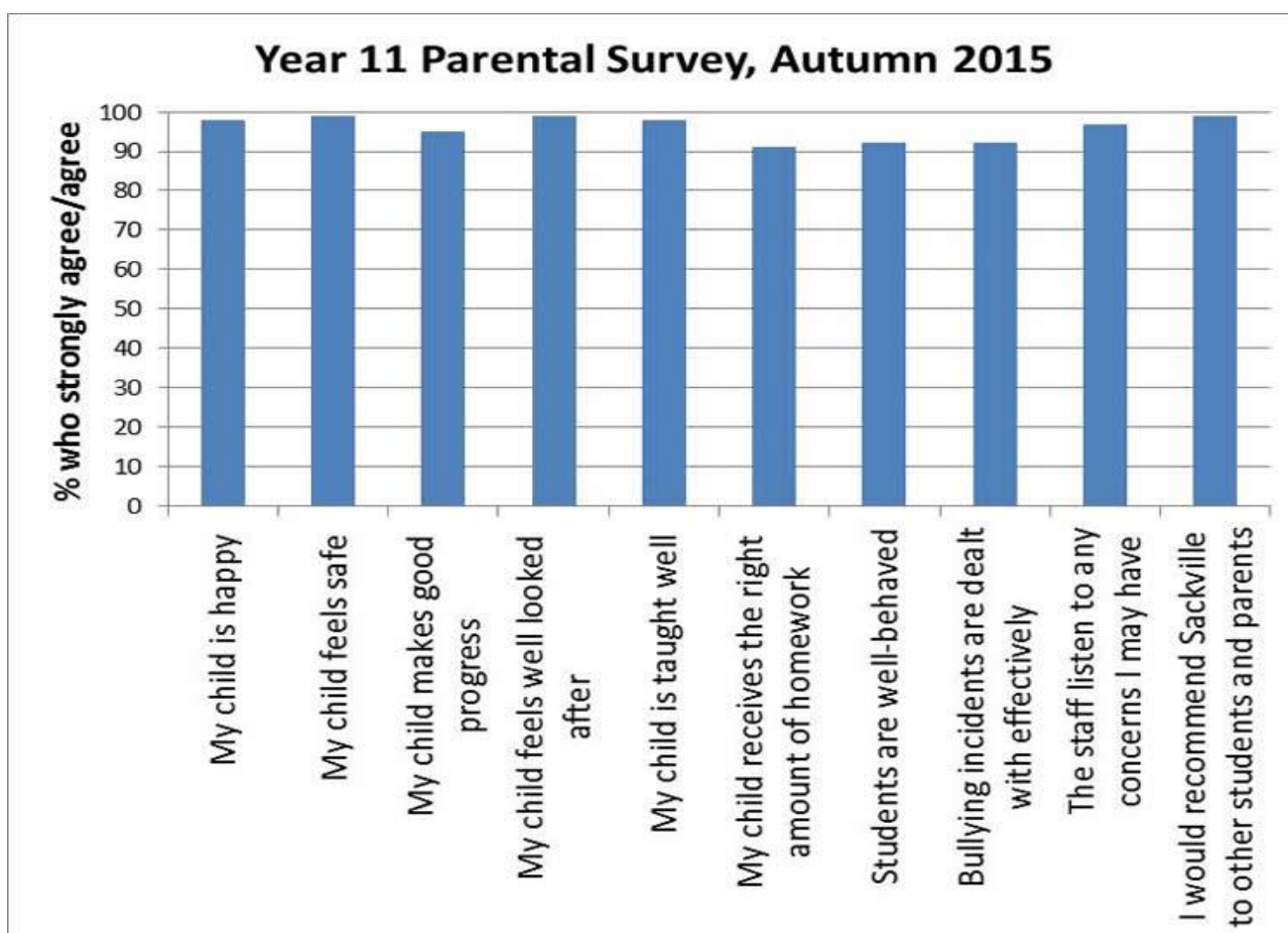
Dear Parents

I am writing this edition of Sackville News in the immediate aftermath of the tragic events in Paris which, I am sure, have shaken us all. It reinforces the importance of our school's **ethos and values** and how we should never take them for granted. It is a challenging world and I have no doubt that Sackville students will be positively influential in its future. As educators, we have a key role to play with you in supporting them in this respect.



On Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> November Sackville remembered the fallen at the town's **Remembrance Parade**. I was privileged to accompany our Head Girl and Head Boy, Nicole de Barra and Michael Turnbull, in laying a wreath at the memorial on the High Street and we were joined by a large number of Sackville families and local residents.

Evidence of our sense of togetherness and understanding has also been reflected in recent **parental survey findings**. In response to the question "I would recommend Sackville to other students and parents" it was fantastic to find that none of our year 11 parents disagreed! We are immensely proud of the responses as shown below, where every question gained a positive score of over 90%:-



We have also had the recent pleasure of welcoming our **year 7 parents** to meet their child's tutor and catch up on early progress last week. The turnout was excellent and reflected the vibrant nature of our home-school partnership. I have no doubt that this is another tremendous year group!

In addition to the year 7 and 11 parents' evenings, we have held our **Sixth Form Open Evening** this month which was very well attended. We are delighted that the provision offered is proving so attractive in the local area as we can now boast a cohort of over 400 students. This is very good news as it also makes the Sixth Form extremely robust with healthy class sizes. Our excellent results are the icing on the cake!



We would like to remind all year 11 applicants to choose **four subjects** to study for examination at AS level in year 12. Students will go on to complete three A levels or BTECs in year 13. This will give students the best possible springboard for applications to university and apprenticeships and a well-structured first year of sixth form.

The Department for Education has recently confirmed that once again in 2015 the progress our students made at both AS and A level was **significantly above the national average** – the **seventh straight year** this has been the case

at AS level, and the **third year in a row** at A2 level. Achieving such progress figures is reinforced by the fact that each year a quarter of our A level results are at A and A\*, half are above a grade B and three quarters are above C.

As ever, there are many students to congratulate on achievements over the past few weeks as seen throughout this bulletin. Alongside this, we have seen two successful trips completed to France (year 9) and St Ives (A level art) last month.

Our community was also drawn together on **Children in Need day** when over £2000 was raised. A fantastic cake sale organised by our staff in the Link was a huge success and the staff-student dodgeball was a major attraction at lunchtime. Earlier in the week, the governors managed to beat the Senior Leadership Team into second place in the annual



I would particularly like to congratulate **Joe Roberts Percy** on gaining an **Arkwright Scholarship**, which is a tremendous accolade. Joe had to complete with over 1600 students to secure one of the prestigious 400 places awarded this year. The scholarship supports young people in becoming future leaders in engineering or technical design and includes a financial reward, an undergraduate scholarship scheme and industry-based engineering work experience days. A challenging aptitude exam and interview was involved in the application process. Joe travelled to the

Mermaid Conference Centre in London during half term to be presented the scholarship, accompanied by head of design and technology, Mr Treen.

This week we were able to celebrate the achievements of our year 10 students who took **fast-track language GCSEs** last summer. As well as



juice and appropriately French croissants, the students also received their exams certificates. Well done to all of them!



As far as our sporting endeavours are concerned, I would like to congratulate our **U13 girls' football team** who recently won the Ardingly School Girls' Football Tournament, scoring 22 goals and conceding only 1! Team manager Miss Offler hailed an exceptional performance in which every one of the girls gave 100%. It is also good to see how well our year 7 girl footballers have settled in.

Meanwhile, the **year 7 boys' football team** continue their amazing start to the season, winning their tenth match on the trot last week to preserve their 100% record. Well done all!

Parents may be interested to know that we have recently installed **photovoltaic panels** on the roof of D block. The photovoltaic panels generate electricity directly from sunlight thereby reducing the use of fossil fuels. The PV installation comprises 106 Solar panels that will generate 27kW of electricity at peak performance. We anticipate the panels generating over 26000 Kwh of energy per year which as a rough estimate equates to an annual saving of 14000 kg of CO2 as it displaces grid-produced electricity.

Currently students in years 9, 11 and 12 are busy fundraising for their upcoming **World Challenge** expeditions, with one imaginative project being the fashion show advertised here. Do support the event this weekend if you are able! Our year 9s go to **Sri Lanka** at Easter 2017, year 11s go to **Thailand, Laos, China and Vietnam** in the summer of 2017 and year 12s go to **India** next summer.

We now have much to look forward to with our **Winter Concert** next Tuesday, 24<sup>th</sup> November at 6.30pm and the **Performing Arts evening** and **Carol Service** both taking place in December. I am sure these will be marvellous events and I look forward to seeing many of you there.

In the meantime, I would like to wish all of our wonderful year 11 students the very best for their forthcoming pre-public (mock) exams. Please find an article below with more information for parents.

## First World War Battlefields visit

I was very honoured to be able to attend this trip.

The day started far earlier than I would like with the alarm going off at 4.30 to be at school for 5.45. Having arrived at school on a dark, grey morning, all the children were in fine spirits.

After only a 30 min delay at Folkestone to depart we arrived at Vimy in France, our first stop.

The trenches were a poignant part of the day and seeing the children fascinated by the whole layout was amazing. They asked questions which the teachers answered and the children listened with awe.

Next to Albert for a lunch stop and a look around the town. If ever you get chance to visit this town I can definitely recommend an amazing coffee shop!! The children had free time here to buy souvenirs and gifts - including French labelled smarties and crisps!

A short drive took us onto the Thiepval Memorial where two children were picked to lay flowers and we all took a minute's silence to give our thoughts and respects to the 72,000 men who died with no known grave. Mr Maywood and Mrs Dunnell gave a lovely speech and a photo of the whole group was taken.

Lastly we headed off to Beaumont Hamel to visit the Newfoundland Memorial. This was an amazing place to end our day with a walk around the battlefields and to see the 'Danger Tree' which the children had been learning about in lesson.

I would like to thank Miss Vance, Miss Garrison, Mr Feist and Mr Grant for involving me in their day. It was truly spectacular and if any future year 8 child gets the opportunity to attend, then take it.



## Benedict Cumberbatch is Hamlet

On Wednesday 21st October 2015 30 Drama students were treated to an afternoon at the Barbican Theatre in London to see a very well-known star in one of Shakespeare's most famous plays: Hamlet, starring Benedict Cumberbatch!



For this performance we were seated in the two front rows and were treated to a fantastically performed play with a star-studded cast, of which the 'bard' would have been very happy.

After this gasp gripping performance, we treated the cast to a standing ovation. After this Mr Cumberbatch gave a heartfelt speech asking us to raise awareness of Save the Children, who are helping Syrian refugees fleeing their home country.

The second drama teacher was the Head of Drama herself, Mrs Beasley, who said “It was the best acting I’ve ever seen! I am also thankful to all students who came with us whose behaviour was absolutely amazing!”

Overall, we can say we couldn’t have been more happy with today! Not only has it been an amazing outing with one of the best departments at Sackville, but I have been able to watch one of my idols live ... in the same room as me!

Chailey Heritage is a school for children and young people with severe and complex mental and physical needs. We would also like to praise our students for their willingness to learn about the work of Chailey Heritage and their willingness to join in. The pictures provide a good explanation of the types of tasks the students were undertaking.

Our students experienced the difficulties and limitations of using a wheelchair and learnt how their dynamic wheelchair engineer specifically adapts wheelchairs based on individual needs. Our students then took part in an Art class. Students were assessed as they worked as part of their BTEC Level 3 in HSC.

Due to strict confidentiality laws, it is not always easy to find health and social care placements where our students are able to be so involved and put in such a trusted position with students. We are grateful to Chailey Heritage for affording us this

opportunity and felt privileged to be part of their environment for a morning. We look forward to a return visit. Some of our students will be completing longer term work experience placements at Chailey Heritage later this academic year.

## BTEC Hospitality students visit 5 star 'South Lodge Hotel'

On Tuesday 20<sup>th</sup> October Year 12 and 13 BTEC level 3 Hospitality students had an amazing day's training at South Lodge Hotel, home of Michelin starred restaurant, 'The Pass'. The head chef Matt Gillan, got his 'goat' main course to the banquet on Great British Menu this year! Unfortunately it was his day off when we visited.

Michael Baxter, the Food and Beverage Manager, gave the students a full day of training. Arriving at our designated conference room for the day – we had tea, coffee, fruit and biscuits.

Michael explained his career path, the structure of staff and training at South Lodge and how they deal with customer feedback. After a full tour of the hotel, the students experienced lunch in the staff canteen, followed by some practical experience of laying tables for a banquet, carrying three plates at a time, pouring wine (disguised as water!) and working as a team serving a table.

The day's training will help the students with their assessment work enormously, and gave them an excellent insight into the working of a 5 star Hotel. Michael was full of enthusiasm for his role and we want to say a huge 'thank you' to him and his staff for their time and preparation for our visit. ## Pre-public exams

We used to call them 'mock exams'. The new title conveys the seriousness with which they are taken by the students and staff at Sackville.

Year 11 PPEs start next week and last for just over a week. After that there are some **immersion sessions** to **improve coursework** in some subjects. Meanwhile staff will be busily marking the exams in readiness for a results afternoon celebration on Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> December.

This can be a stressful time for students as the exams are compressed into a very short period and revision time is short. Our teaching, homework and coursework continue right up to the day of the first exam.



Parents can be crucial during this time, and any support will really benefit your son or daughter (even if they do not show it at the time). They will be even more tired than usual, and will benefit from a bit of encouragement and TLC. The more they can do now, the easier it will be in the summer when the real exams come round.

Are we just giving exams for the sake of it? Not at all! Our year 12 students tell us that the PPEs in December and March were crucial in them getting such outstanding results this summer. We know our current year 11s can do better!

In order to help students learn outside school, we are now using Google Classroom. Mr Attrill explains below how this works.

## Sackville School e-Learning Tools: Using The Google Drive and Google Docs

Mr Attrill writes:-

Using the **Google Drive** can be a really simple, useful tool for students (and teachers!) to help organise their documents better and enable them to access their documents from any computer or mobile phone!

To access your Google Drive follow these steps:

1. Log on to the Sackville Homepage (<http://www.sackville.w-sussex.sch.uk/>) and then navigate to the 'Students' tab and then click on 'Google Apps'.
2. Log-in with your 'MySackville' email address (which will be your computer login name (e.g. 12BloggsJ) and then '@mysackville.co.uk'. The password will be 'password' for new users.
3. Then click on the Google Drive icon on the right hand side and you will be taken to your Google Drive (also available at: <https://drive.google.com/drive/my-drive>)
4. From this page you can drag and drop files from your computer documents and create folders to keep things organised.
5. If you right-click on any of these files or folders, you have the option to decide who these files are shared with – either private for yourself or shared with other students if you wish to work on something together.
6. You can then send them the link to this file by also selecting that option from the right-click menu. You can also download or rename the file this way too.
7. You can also create new documents by selecting 'New' in the top left and then selecting a new Google Docs file (similar to Microsoft Word), Google Sheets (similar to Excel) or Google Slides (similar to PowerPoint), even if they haven't got the software at home! This will then work on any computer at school to either be presented or printed as normal, or can be downloaded and saved in the traditional Microsoft product format.

Students can access their Google Drive from home in the same method described as above, or on their mobile phone if they download the Google Drive app and then login with their 'MySackville' login.

It is advised that students also back up their most important files at school (e.g. coursework) as all data is backed up here and the IT technicians can recover older versions of documents if they are saved at school.
