We seem to have arrived at the Easter break incredibly quickly and, as ever, there has been so much happening at Sackville.

I am really delighted to begin this edition of Sackville News by sharing the following press release we have just received:-

'Sackville School wins national award for performance'

Sackville School has been recognised nationally for its excellent results in 2018 based on data from the **Department for Education and Ofsted**, analysed by SSAT (the Schools, Students and Teachers network). Sackville School was found to be among the best performing secondary schools in the country, receiving an award for being in the top 20% of schools nationally for progress. The SSAT Educational Outcomes database compares all state-funded schools in England and the highest performing schools for a



range of key measures are awarded SSAT Educational Outcomes Awards. Sackville School will be presented with their award during the summer term at a ceremony attended by winners from across the region.

Sue Williamson, Chief Executive of SSAT said: "I am delighted that Sackville School has won an Educational Outcomes Awards. This recognises one important aspect of the school's work but at SSAT we believe an outstanding school has deep social justice at the heart of its plan; it subjects that plan to constant challenge and innovation; and it liberates teachers to perform brilliantly in the classroom. SSAT is pleased to recognise the quality of leadership and the hard work of all staff to ensure the success of every child. A big thank you and well done to students, parents, staff and governors."

Needless to say, we are over the moon about this!

To mark the end of the spring term and as a token gesture, we gave each year 11 student a 'good luck' pack to take away with them from the final assembly which they will hopefully find both useful and enjoyable!



Last Wednesday we were delighted to welcome everyone to our annual Sports Presentation Evening to which we welcomed our special guest Sophie Bray MBE. Sophie was part of the stunningly successful gold medal-winning GB women's hockey team in the 2016 Rio Olympics and she talked about her journey to the top and how important it is to have personal goals.



Students were awarded for both efforts in lessons and for performances on the sports fields, with both individual and team achievements recognised.



Tim Cox presented the Matt Cox Memorial Award to Joe Sheridan – a very deserving recipient who is about to tour Sri Lanka with Surrey Cricket Club's elite player squad. Tim talked of how sport allows you to make lifelong friends, and that we should cherish the social side as well as the competitive.

The award for the 'sports personality of the year' went to James Young, an equally deserving choice. James has represented the school at pretty much every sport over his five years at Sackville.





Two weeks ago we held a special celebration tea for all of our **year 9 students** who had achieved strong attitude to learning scores on their recent reports – and it was many of them! I am delighted by the numbers achieving such success in their first year of studying GCSE. I would also like to thank the year team of **Mrs Sands** and **Mrs Newcomb** who work extremely hard in supporting

the students every day of the school year.

Our **year 10 musicians** were extremely fortunate to be visited by **Alex Baranowski** on

26th March. Alex came in to the music BTEC lesson to share his experiences of working as a composer.

The students were enthralled as he discussed the ins and outs of working on **Broadway**, the **West End** and the **film industry**.



He is currently composing the music for the **new Christmas Carol film** due for release later this year which the students await with great anticipation. He also arranged the theme tune for the **BBC's 2018 World Cup** coverage.

Staying on a musical theme, Crawley was alive to the sound of **Sackville musicians and singers** on Monday 18th March, as our performers lit up the stage at **The Hawth** as part of the second annual **Crawley Sings Live**. Songs such as *Something Just like This* and *Happy Endings* had the whole audience foot-tapping.

Sackville's band was the talk of the evening and its singers were exemplary in their conduct and support on stage. Many **secondary mainstream**

and special schools took part and the sound of them all singing together was heartening. I certainly enjoyed it!

A group of 35 year 9 and 10 students visited Pas de Calais for a **French language trip** during the last week of March. Their visits included an **artisan chocolate maker**, an **old-fashioned sweet maker**, a **boulangerie** (with a terrifying baker!) and a morning in a **French school**.



All visits and even the instructions at the hotel were **conducted in French** and the staff were delighted by the students' positive response to this challenge.



Chemistry Olympiad 2018-19

Dr Morley writes:-

'Draw dot and cross diagrams for carbon dioxide and carbon monoxide.' was the first question in this year's Chemistry Olympiad question paper. Whilst this is fairly straight-forward, the rest of the questions certainly weren't. But questions like these didn't stop two of our year 13 chemistry students from entering this year's competition.



As in previous years, the competition started with a two hour paper comprising university-style questions. Students progressing from this are then invited to a residential weekend from which the top four students in the country will represent the UK at the International Chemistry Olympiad which this year is in Paris. Despite the timing for the paper clashing with mock A level revision, **Ellie Bush** and **Caspar Parsonage** decided to go for it.

The question paper proved to be much more difficult than last year, with the grade boundaries adjusted accordingly. And whilst Ellie and Caspar did not make it through to the residential weekend, they did score enough marks to be awarded Bronze certificates. This is a brilliant achievement and highlights their excellence in A level Chemistry.

They both deserve huge credit for entering, especially at a critical time in their A level preparations, and continues Sackville's success in Chemistry competitions, following the 'Top of the Bench' event a couple of months ago. Many congratulations to Ellie and Caspar.

By the way, just in case you're wondering what the dot and cross diagrams are, I have reproduced them here.

Law students' Magistrates in the Community experience

A selection of our year 12 and year 13 students took part in a 'Magistrates in the Community' session on Friday. This involved three local magistrates presenting about the role magistrates have in the Criminal Courts. Our students were actively involved in role-playing a bail application, a trial based on shoplifting and helping to determine the sentence of a young man who pleaded guilty to two counts of assaulting a police officer.

In the image we see Morgen Hake completing her examination of Molly Bryant who played the role of an accused shoplifter whilst our Sackville Magistrates (Oscar Arro, Dan Harding and Charlotte



Nolan) tried to determine her guilt. Unfortunately for Molly, her character Lottie, was found guilty and faces a possible custodial sentence of six months. All the students were grateful for the time the visitors took to explain the importance of justice being carried out without fear or favour.

As for Molly, she should be out in time for her progression exams with good behaviour ...

Type 1 Awareness

Mrs Knock writes about her experiences with her year 10 son Jacob.

Type 2 diabetes (usually brought on by lifestyle) is in the news all the time at the moment but children are mostly diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes (an autoimmune condition). This means that they are tasked with keeping themselves alive daily by calculating insulin doses by having to count carbohydrates, measure what levels of activity they are doing, include their stress levels, changes in the weather, how much sleep they've had and how their hormones are reacting!

As you can imagine this is not an easy task and the usual management is via pen injections and insulin pumps. However there are a small minority who are not waiting for the medical profession but are venturing out and building their own artificial pancreases. This is exactly what I have done for my son Jacob; it's a system called *Closed Looping*. Because of this we were invited up to London in February to present to four hundred people (including medical professionals, medical companies and people interested in what we are doing). We were sharing the stage with some top names in the world of diabetes. Jacob did amazingly in his presentation sharing about the complexity of building, the difference it has made to his life and how he wants to share the technology with others.

Dr Partha Kar then personally invited Jacob and me to the Royal College of Physicians on 30th March, to be a part of an exclusive event and for us to be able to share our closed looping experience. Four hundred people attended and Jacob met some famous Type 1s such as Mohammad Ali (boxer), Sam Brand (cyclist), James Norton (actor) and lots of professors and consultants. Jacob took it all in his stride, networked very well and has been invited back next year to be a speaker alongside the professionals.

Although Type 1 is challenging for those children having to cope with life alongside it, medical technology and personal determination make it an exciting time to be part of a process of making life a little less challenging. This is by no means a cure but it does help the life of a sporty laid back teenage boy and means slightly less nagging from his mum!


