Our chemists are 'Top of the Bench'

Sackville was represented at the Royal Society of Chemistry 'Top of the Bench' Chemistry competition at Millais School on Wednesday 6th December by Eleanor Canepa-Anson, Alec Bignall, Dan Beard and Eric Parker. There were seven schools competing, carrying out 45 minute practical tests and 30 minute multiple choice tests. The practical tests really challenged the students but they performed admirably, obtaining excellent results and plotting high quality graphs. The scores from both tests were added together and Sackville finished in a credible fourth place overall, only missing out on a spot in the top three by two marks. The students really enjoyed the experience, demonstrating their passion for Chemistry and for representing Sackville with enthusiasm and pride. Well done all four!



Our physicists have a pretty good time too

A level Physics trip to Dungeness B Nuclear Power Station Mr Wilcox writes:-

We drove down to Dungeness B power station with thoughts of Homer Simpson and men in full radiation suits in our minds but as soon as we arrived our misconceptions started to be corrected. We started off being kitted out in full health and safety outfits including high-vis jackets, helmets, ear defenders and gloves and then made our way to the tight security. Once through the metal detectors, security card reading door locks, pin number turnstiles and past the barbed wire fences with CCTV cameras we were finally in the main PowerStation area. Our tour started by telling us the history of the site and nuclear power production in the UK and then we



headed into the reactor room viewing gallery. The only nuclear power stations in the world where you can view the top of the reactor are the advanced gas cooled reactors and they are only in the UK. It was fascinating to see the top of the fuel shafts and cooling rod shafts, to watch the workers preparing to refuel the uranium fuel rods and to get a sense of the scale of the power station. Whilst watching this we were told some nuclear power statistics, such as the fact that a single 18g uranium fuel pellet will produce as much energy as one million tonnes of coal and that in the fifty years of nuclear energy production the total volume of high level radioactive waste would fit in two London buses.


After we left the reactor viewing room we then headed to the turbine hall. This was very noisy and we were very pleased to have our ear defenders on. The turbine hall is where the hot water from the reactor makes steam to drive a series of turbines which then produce the 1 Giga Watt of electrical power. Our next stop of the tour was the water inlet to see the vast amount of sea water which is used to cool down the turbine outlet water so it can be reused. Finally we were taken into the control room training suite. This is an exact copy of the Power Station control room where staff train for any potential situation. It looked really out of date with 1960's wooden desks and old switches but the technology behind them is cutting edge; apparently the workers prefer the old style switches to touch screens! After our tour we had lunch back at the visitors' centre and then had a competition to build a pair of electricity pylons which were able to hold the most weight; we were reasonably successful at this and it was a nice fun way to finish the day.

Astronomy research with Sussex University

Mr Bush and Mr Keeble write:-

A group of fifteen year 12 students recently embarked on an exciting project allowing students studying A level physics to work with professional astronomers at the University of Sussex. This is a unique opportunity that aims to develop students' skills and understanding of the physical world, inspire students to follow a career in physical sciences or mathematics at university and enhance UCAS applications.

Working together, we have developed a project to use both the University's own large telescope, situated in Chelwood Gate, and the Sackville Observatory to gather data on the magnitude of variable stars. Students attended a launch event at the University last month and will return there



in the late spring to analyse their data with professional guidance. During their visit, students learnt about why stars vary their brightness and had a tour or the University facilities, including their rooftop observatory and radio telescope (see photo). We aim to begin collecting data from real observations in January and will report back with an update in the spring term.

AIG come to talk to sixth form business students

Chris Burgess (**UK Cyber Insurance leader**) from AIG visited Sackville to speak to year 13 A level Business students about working in insurance, developments in the industry and why it might interest them.

Chris also spoke about his time working in graduate recruitment for AIG and explained what the students can expect from a graduate programme and how to get the best chance of success during the recruitment and selection process.

Chris allowed time for students to ask questions and was impressed with the questions asked. Chris spoke about overcoming adversity as a key element of success and gave an insight into personal mistakes he had made and how he managed to turn them into a positive and ultimately learnt from his

errors. He explained the significance of remaining positive and how that can be a key driver in meeting your goals. Chris wrote:

"I was very pleased with the class engagement, several of them raised very good questions which demonstrated to me that they were thinking about the topics we were covering. I thought they were particularly engaged on the two topics of 'Technology changing jobs in the future', and 'How to get access to jobs', two good questions came out of that, and I hope my answers to them provided some further guidance for them. I would add that I thought the attitude of the pupils during the discussion was engaging and polite"

Sixth Form updates

University and apprenticeship news

Our strong links with the **University of Ulster** are going from strength to strength. Mrs Underdown, (Sixth Form Secretary) and Mr Bush (Leader of Professional Development), have enjoyed taking **two groups of students there in November for Open Days** specifically geared towards attracting students from the mainland to study in Northern Ireland. The university went to a massive effort to make our students feel welcome and to provide a real insight into the courses. We are very grateful to University of Ulster for making these visits possible, as well as to our students for taking up these excellent opportunities. One visit was specifically targeting students for bio-medical science related degrees and the other visit targeted law and economics related degrees. The Business Studies students participated in workshops and did team building tasks and assessments. The day culminated with a city tour of Belfast. All students came away with goody bags including prospectuses and University of Ulster hoodies.

Mrs Underdown writes about her two day visit to Ulster in early November:-

After a long day at school and journey from Gatwick, we arrived in Belfast to be transported by coach to our hotel accommodation (courtesy of the university). Once we were shown to our rooms which the students were really pleased with, we all had something to eat then went to straight to bed!

Up for an early start, we had breakfast and then travelled to Ulster University at 8.15am, where with other schools we met Natasha and the rest of the team from Ulster University.

We had a Group Campus Tour around the Coleraine Campus and were shown the accommodation, library, study areas, student union and lecture theatres.

We all attended a *Welcome Presentation* with Dr Karise Hutchinson which included a talk about the university and the different campuses, explaining all the different types of degrees on offer. Dr James Nesbitt, the Chancellor, also came on stage which was a lovely unexpected surprise and spoke about Ulster University. He was spending the day in the Riverside Theatre working with students at the university. There was also an ex-student that spoke about her experiences.

All the students attended their first workshop. I went along to the psychology workshop which was extremely

interesting, talking about the huge range of accredited degrees available and work placements.

Other workshops available were biology, pharmacy, stratified medicine and optometry.

We had lunch with representatives of the students' union who were able to answer any questions we wanted to ask.

Next we went to our second workshop of the day. I went along to the bio-medical workshop where we had to test blood samples for a pretend crime scene investigation. Students had to work in groups and were provided with four blood samples and had to determine each blood group using anti-A and anti-B immunoglobulins.



We then collected our Ulster goodie bags which included a hoodie and materials to take home and returned to the coach to be taken to the airport.

Degree Apprenticeship Open Day visit and Nursing apprenticeship opportunities

The sixth form team had the pleasure of the company of 37 year 12 and 13 students on 6th December when we took them to Portsmouth University for the evening to find out more about degree apprenticeships, a post-16 route that is gaining in popularity. They involve students gaining a work placement and then spending some of their time at university learning the theory to back up what they are doing at work. More and more employers are involved in this and the university did a very good

job at looking after us and explaining what was available, with lots of speakers from various disciplines/courses on hand to explain the finer details.

We will endeavour to do more of these visits as and when they come up. Needless to say the students were attentive, listened keenly to what was discussed and made the most of the visit and the information they were given.

Many of our health and social care students are interested in following a career in the nursing profession. We are thrilled with the links that Mrs Rooke and Mrs Underdown have established with our local hospital, the Queen Victoria in East Grinstead.

On 3rd November, we welcomed five speakers to give teachers and students a comprehensive guide on how to access nursing training on the apprenticeship programme which is being launched in the next year. It was particularly nice that two of the speakers were our exstudents – Ashley Kaufman and Rebecca Low. Both of these students have had high quality training through the Queen Vic and are either en-route to being now highly qualified or already highly qualified.

This is in addition to Jack Burchett who is currently undertaking training there. We are proud of the achievements of our ex-students and very grateful they gave their time freely to inspire our current generation of sixth form students.



Recently members of staff from across the hospital visited Sackville School in East Grinstead to talk to students in years 12, 13 and 14 about what we do at QVH and how each of them chose to take up a career in the health care sector. Students loved hearing each person's journey and how they're shaping their career. Thank you to all of the lovely students for their enthusiasm and to our team for taking the time to inspire the QVH staff of the future!



English Schools Swimming Association Secondary Schools Relay Nationals

This year is the 60th Secondary Schools Team Championships and was held at the Olympics Aquatics Centre in London. Prior to this event, schools had to compete to qualify for the National Finals which for Sackville, was held at Horsham Pavillions. The qualifying events are held around the country and only the top 30 fastest teams go through to the finals. The teams for each age group comprise four pupils who compete in both the 4x50m Freestyle and 4x50m Medley Relays.

Sackville took eight teams to the qualifying event consisting of all three age groups (junior, intermediate and seniors). Pupils had the challenge of competing against a range of schools – more so than normal as we also had teams from across Sussex, Kent and Surrey. Everyone involved showed fantastic enthusiasm, teamwork and support for each other throughout the day.

As a result of the fantastic swims in the qualifying stage, two teams were successful in getting through to the finals; the junior girls (freestyle relay) and the intermediate boys (medley relay). It is also important to note that the junior boys' medley relay team and intermediate boys' freestyle relay team were reserve teams for the finals, but were unfortunate not to be put through on this occasion.

On Saturday 18th November the junior girls and intermediate boys travelled to the London Aquatics Centre for the chance to compete in their qualified events. The girls had qualified in 24th place whilst the boys qualified 17th. Both teams swam exceptionally well in their heats and rose to the occasion of competing against some of the best school teams in the country. Each team improved their times and places, with the girls finishing in a time of 2:06:01 resulting in 18th place and the boys finishing in a time of 2:02:79 resulting in 12th place.

It was a fantastic event and the pupils should be incredibly proud of their impressive efforts. Thank you to their parents for transporting them and supporting them throughout the event. We will look forward to continued success next year.
