Dear Parents,

I hope that 2018 is progressing well for all of you!

We have very much hit the ground running here with **four parents' evenings** taking place this month: years eight and ten with subject teachers, a year 11 revision support evening and an e-safety awareness evening for years 7 and 8. I do believe that regular consultation is important and it was great for me to catch up with so many of you.

> Our sixth form students are undertaking their mock examinations this week and I would like to wish them all the best for that. We deliberately time this to coincide with our two staff training days so that students miss the minimum amount of teaching time possible for these exams.

Our inset days start with a meeting of the teaching and

learning research groups we have running this year, and this is followed by work on how to enhance the role of the tutor at school, including training on the delivery of spiritual, moral, social and cultural education (SMSC).

On the second day, we are delighted to host the world-renowned educational expert Shirley Clarke, who will talk about enhancing our learning culture. This is followed by staff working in their departments to create and review 'personal learning checklists' (PLCs) which we have found are a significant help to students as they take control of their own learning and revision. Some staff are also having their first aid qualification re-validated.

Our training days are always purposeful and focused on the enhancement of teaching quality. They do remind me how fortunate I am to have such dedicated staff!

> Earlier this month I had the pleasure of accompanying a group of our year 13 students to Germany where they undertook a variety of work placements in Hamburg, as well as a very interesting visit to Berlin. I would like to thank the staff who gave up their time to support the students: Mrs Valentine, Ms Flatman, Mr Whitehead and Mr Leahy and also to Mrs Underdown and Mrs Rooke who were very supportive with arrangements. I can now navigate the S-Bahn, U-Bahn and Deutsche Bahn pretty well!

The range of work experience was varied and interesting, including an international law firm, shipping companies, a corporate events agency, logistics and a pre-school nursery. I was very impressed by the approach of the students to the challenges they undertook and with the organisations which looked after them well. I am proud that the

school offers such opportunities and grateful to our partner school

in this venture. This partnership now stretches well over ten years and we are welcoming a group of their students back to East Grinstead in February to undertake work placements here.















One of their placements will be at **Chailey Heritage School** for which we do a lot of fund raising. Indeed, only this week **our year 10 students presented a cheque for over £1000** during an assembly.

This money will go towards providing for students with very complex special needs, which often involves producing **bespoke engineered solutions**. Our students listened with amazement as **Al Carter** from the school talked about the work they do.

Our **sports hall indoor athletics competitions** are becoming renowned in the local area, not least because many primary schools are frequently involved and the organisation of them by Mrs Currie is second to none.

Last week, our **year 8 indoor athletics team** excelled in the finals with

the girls winning with 147 points and the **boys coming second**. This week, our **year 7 teams** were in action, with the girls narrowly beaten into second place, and the boys coming fourth.

Our under 13 netballers have also made an excellent start to the league with three good wins over Warden Park, Millais and St. Paul's. Well done all!

Year 12 student **Oliver Roberts** is making the trek to **Everest Base Camp** next month and is raising funds at the same time, which is really excellent.

"In February 2018, I will be trekking with a group to the Base Camp of Mount Everest which lies at an altitude of 17,600 ft above sea level. The trip will last just over two weeks from the 17th of February until the 4th of March. Any money I raise in completing the trek will go to the **Teenage Cancer Trust in memory of Matt Rieley**, an ex-student of our school, who sadly passed away in

May 2016. Matt was such a huge part of many people's lives in East Grinstead, especially within the Sackville community. Matt fought his illness with courage, determination and never lost his sense of humour – he was an inspiration to many."

I am sure we would all like to wish Oliver the very best for this challenge and adventure. The link to his fundraising page is <u>here</u>.

Finally, it always sad when members of staff leave us and no more so than when they have given ten years of loyal service to the school. **Harry Burton**, our **Premises Manager**, is retiring on Friday 26th January and we wish him all the best. Stargazing live with Sackville

Mr Bush writes:-

A-Level physics students continued their **variable star research project** with the **University of Sussex** by visiting their observatory in Chelwood Gate on 10th January. Luckily, skies were clear throughout the evening, although mist descended later on making low-altitude observations of the Orion Nebula challenging. Students toured the facility before taking full control of the scope, aligning, slewing and finding the target star (V2455 Cyg) first time!

They then collected a sequence of photographs which they will then process to reveal the pulsating nature of this star. They will also process their images of the Orion Nebula, overlaying each of the three coloured images to produce a final full colour picture. Additionally they had a visual experience through a 200mm reflecting telescope courtesy of Dr Baskill from the University.

Routes in to nursing: Year 11/12/13 Health and Social care careers talk and tour of Queen Victoria Hospital

Monday 15th January saw 14 students from years 11-14 attend **the much anticipated tour of QVH** accompanied by Mrs Rooke and Mrs Underdown. The students were greeted by nine members of staff in the Staff Development Centre with roles across the hospital from HR to operating department practitioner. The students were given resuscitation training on both adult and child CPR training manikins and a full debrief and training on hygiene and infection control. Students were also given advice on how to apply for roles within the hospital.

Our guided tour around the core services provided an informative overview of the hospital, visiting the Peanut Ward, Canada Ward, outpatients and the world renowned Maxillofacial Department.

The newly refurbished high tech theatres gave the students the opportunity to handle theatre equipment tools and discuss the process from anaesthesia through to recovery.

We would like to extend our thanks to QVH for providing our students a wonderful insight into all the different roles and opportunities available and look forward to forging an even stronger working relationship in the future. We also look forward in future years to visiting some of our students who are hoping to gain employment and training there.

News from the travelling geographer

Mr Attrill continues his travelogue from South America:-

Hello again!



It has been a couple of months since this **ex-Sackville geography teacher** sent an update from the road, so here is what I've been up to since I last wrote.

Patagonia was full of epic sights including the Perito Merino Glacier (apparently the only growing glacier in the world, but sadly only because climate change is exacerbating the accumulation of meltwater from other nearby glaciers) and a great hike to Mt Fitz Roy and a beautiful blue lake.

I then met up with some travelling friends in Cusco, Peru and together we did a four day Jungle Trek culminating in a 5am arrival at **Machu Picchu** itself (first picture). Exploring the ruins of what was the jewel in the crown of the Incan Empire over 500 years ago was quite

special, and I was blown away by their stunning architecture and infrastructure that really was ahead of their time. Whilst in Cusco I also visited a place called Rainbow Mountain (second picture), which really was a geographer's dream due to the layers of silt which have accumulated to give the site its unique appearance!



After traversing Lake Titicaca (the highest navigable lake in the world), I arrived in Bolivia and spent a few days in La Paz (at a breath-taking altitude of 3640m). From here



I visited the Amazon Rainforest on a Pampas Tour and saw a huge amount of wildlife such as pink river dolphins, sloths, capybara, caiman (bottom picture) and toucans whilst sailing down the Rio Yucuma. It really hit home how special this magical environment is and how important conservation efforts are to protect this natural wonder.

I then travelled through other interesting Bolivian cities before arriving at the Salar de Uyuni - a huge salt flat (third picture). Here we learnt how German and now Chinese investment is increasing their influence in this mining area, despite attempts to nationalise the industry. We saw bright green lakes full of pink flamingos, islands full of cacti and almost endless expanses of flat salt-covered wilderness. An incredible place!

I finished the South America leg of my journey in the very modern feeling city of Santiago and flew to New Zealand to spend Christmas with family out there. The next couple of

months will see me exploring the two main islands of this beautiful country and witnessing its stunning natural scenery. Happy New Year to everyone!
