

Matthew only just missed a bronze so they both did extraordinarily well.

Isaac Kilpatrick-Harrap has recently volunteered his services at **Chailey Heritage School** and had an

excellent day. The staff of the school were over the moon about his attitude and composure, helping young children to have PE sessions on adapted bikes and also supporting them in a craft session. They want him to return regularly and he will be featuring in their newsletter as well as ours! This is yet another fine example of community outreach from our superb students.





Our three day transition programme for year 6 has now taken place and they have started to become familiar with many aspects of Sackville life. 




The Reading Group thought it was; "engaging, eye opening, great plot, insightful, cleverly written, really sympathize with Jemma's plight".




We have finished now for this year but will start again with year 8 and 9 students next October. To register your interest please come to the LRC and find out more.

Sports highlights

The season of summer sport is about to reach its climax with our four sports days – please do come and support. Meanwhile, our sportspeople have continued working their way through their frantic fixture lists.

Our year 7s have been busy. The **rounders** team were runners up to Warden Park in the Mid Sussex Tournament. The entire team were awarded 'Player of Tournament' because of their brilliant play.



Their male counterparts made a mammoth 124-2 to beat Lingfield College with two overs to spare – a remarkable total for year 7s. Plyer of the Match was Dominic Newman for his brilliant wicket keeping. The B team lost by just five runs, with Ben Freeman doing well with the bat, and Harrison Cowx taking three wickets.

Year 8s (pictured) have a strong boys' **cricket** team. Last month they also beat Lingfield, thanks to Liam Dawes' typically pugnacious 35, and three wickets apiece for Ellis Beynon and Joe Walsh. The B team also won surpassing Lingfield's total with one ball to spare. Max Morgan was player of the match for his 25 runs and two wickets.

The A team are through to the Area Cup final after beating Tanbridge House by 8 wickets, built on quite ridiculous hitting of Liam Dawes, who struck 32 off one over, and Jake Lingard's equally astonishing bowling return of 5 wickets for one run.

Both boys were also on form against Skinners, but still the team still lost against a strong side.

Meanwhile the U13 girls' team came third in a Mid Sussex tournament. Player of the Tournament was Annie Lyons for her bowling, with Emma Smyth, Molly Sutton and Ella Kessell putting in strong performances.

Our U14 boys lost against a strong Warden Park team despite Joe Sheridan's knock of 24, and Caspar Arthur's two wickets.

The U15s were less fortunate against Tanbridge, losing by nine wickets despite Euan Raeside's 32 runs.

The standout result in athletics since our last newsletter is that Sackville won the Mid Sussex Year 7 competition. Well done!
