Dear Parents and Carers

As we get to the end of our second school year which has been heavily affected by the pandemic, I would like to start by thanking the entire Sackville community for their support and assistance over the last eighteen unprecedented months. Without such a wonderful group of students, parents, carers and staff my last full year at the helm would have been almost impossible.

The beginning of next year is now becoming clearer, and we know we will have a **staggered start and once again be testing all students for COVID before they start back**. There is more information later in this newsletter.

In the meantime, a **lot has been happening at Sackville**. Being able to run **sports days**, albeit behind closed doors, was a sign of a return to normal. The enthusiasm was palpable for our year 7s and 8s; you could hear their cheers throughout the school! I always find the effort that students put into these days impressive and the support they give each other particularly heartening.



None of this would be possible without the organisation and drive of our PE teachers, and the support of an ensemble cast of other staff and older students who support each event. It was unfortunate for year 9 that their day of sport was cancelled due to the weather.

Next year I hope that we will be able to host sports days for all four year groups, and also invite parents in as spectators once again.

We are fast approaching the end of term, but **life for our senior students remains busy**. Many of our **year 11s** have been back in school **attending taster sessions**. The first picture below shows a biology class. Meanwhile our year 12 students, fresh out of their **progression exams**, focussed on their futures on Monday 12th July, with **individual appointments with their tutors**, and input from outside advisors. A special thanks to **Kate Averre** for giving up a day of her time to talk to our **Oxbridge cohort**.



Also on that Monday several of our students presented their EPQs (**Extended Project Qualifications**). These projects require a substantial amount of individual research and work, and are highly valued by universities. Well done to **Ciara Humphrey**, **Sophie Taylor**, **Taylor Goodall**, **Ben Salter**, **Zara Keetley**, **Hannah Sisley**, **Holly Aston** and **Leo Gott**, whose EPQs ranged from the Bayeux Tapestry to artificial intelligence.

Our **year 12 geography students** went to London last week to look at the geography of urban regeneration in the Docklands area. This trip gives them a strong head start on their assessed project, as well as sharpening their fieldwork skills. Thank you to **Mr Gerretsen** and **Mr Johnson** for organising the trip.



As a history teacher I am delighted that we were able to present the inaugural **Michael Leppard History Prize** last week. The prize is in memory of former teacher Michael Leppard who

passed away in 2019, and is sponsored by the <u>East Grinstead Society</u> of which Michael was a founder member.



Entrants were asked to produce a short project on the history of the town, and this year the prize was shared by four year 7 and 8 students. Well done to Tomas Dewberry, Giselle Currie, Elsa Woodcock and Lilly Hill. Each student received a £25 WH Smith voucher, presented by Mr James Baldwin, Chair of the East Grinstead Society.

Next year students will be able to work on an entry for the prize in our extra-curricular history club.



This week has been particularly busy, with some events rescheduled from earlier in the year. I'd like to thank our **remarkable staff for doing back-to-back evening events this week** to support our students. On Monday we were delighted to welcome in our **new year 6 students**, each with one parent, for a socially distanced briefing in the hall where I was joined by Mr Endersby and Mr Street, followed by a chance to meet the students' new tutor. We have missed our three-day transition programme this year, but are looking forward to our year 7s coming in for their **induction day on Monday September 6**th.

On Tuesday afternoon it was the turn of the students at the other end of the school. An unorthodox end to an unorthodox two years, but we managed to say goodbye and good luck to our **year 13 students with an afternoon tea** served by the school leadership team. With the current rise in COVID rates we felt it was safer not to hold the usual style of sixth form prom, the second year we have had to cancel it. Instead, a good number of the year group enjoyed a very warm and luckily dry afternoon beneath the large Sackville oak tree and reminisced about their time at school, and their unique sixth form experience, with so much of it home learning.


On Wednesday we held our **year 11 prom**. This, again, was toned

Exam results

Just a reminder that GCE and level 3 vocational exam results (mainly year 13) come out on **Tuesday 10**th **August** and GCSE and level 2 vocational results (mainly years 10 and 11) come out on **Thursday 12**th **August**. We will **email these out** to students' school email addresses shortly after 8.30am on each day.

Last year it took up to an hour for the messages to be delivered by Capita as almost every school was doing the same thing. We will be open from 9.00am each day if students want to come in and get results instead.

As befits a very different exam season, there is a **different appeals process** this year. There is full guidance on this process from the Joint Council for Qualifications here (see pages 6-8). We have copies of the appeals form on our website. A *Word* version is available here for candidates who wish to complete using a computer, and a pdf version here, for those who wish to print out and complete by hand.

Unlike in normal years when we have the benefit of student marks and grade boundaries to guide decisions about which grades to query, it is important to note that the result of an appeal in 2021 is that **grades could go down**. If a grade does go down after an appeal, it will not be possible to revert to the original grade.

Standards and Expectations:

Mr Street writes:-

As we approach the summer holidays and following a period of grace in what has been a turbulent year I think it is important to remind you of Sackville's high expectations of students before the new academic year to avoid any unnecessary confusion at the start of term.

'Give Me 5' is a simple and memorable way of summarising our high expectations. The poster below clearly displays our five expectations and I hope you will agree these are standards that our community would want from all young people both in and out of school.



School Uniform:

We fully appreciate that school uniform has been more difficult to purchase at times over the last twelve months and that many students have demonstrated their individuality with regards to haircuts and colour during periods of lockdown. I would appreciate that parents assist students in addressing issues regarding uniform and appearance over the summer so they can return to school in September ready to learn and following our uniform guidelines.

Skirt Uniform

Navy pleated skirt	Knee length or just above

In addition to the above it is also worth noting that:

No jewellery other than a wrist watch and a set of plain stud earrings are acceptable. Any other piercings of any kind will be
asked to be removed.
Shirts must be worn tucked in.
Nail varnish and acrylic nails are not permitted.
Extreme haircuts and colours are not permitted. Grade 2 or below and tram lines of any description are not allowed. Hair
colour must be natural and dip dyes are not acceptable.
Make up in year 9 or above must be discreet, particularly eye make-up.

At Sackville we believe that 'Together we Achieve' and parents can support the school in educating students in how best to behave in a respectful, responsible and appropriate way, ensuring all students uphold our high expectations.

As always, I thank you for supporting us to ensure that all Sackville students can be proud of their appearance, behaviour and conduct. Should you have any questions about the uniform or our high expectations then please do not hesitate to contact your child's Year Leader or me.
