Dear Parents.

We have certainly had an eventful and busy time since returning from half term!





I would like to begin by thanking you all once again for your support during the days of challenging weather last week. The year 11 mock examinations went ahead as normal, with year 10 also sitting their Beliefs and Values mock exam. Apart from year 12, all year groups missed only one day or less of school. The learning atmosphere in classrooms was calm and

purposeful

and the younger students in particular enjoyed snowballing with the staff at breaks and lunchtimes!



None of this would have been possible without the **dedication of the staff** in preparing the school site each morning. Teachers and support staff joined the site team in clearing the pathways and car parks with great camaraderie. 'Together We Achieve' was certainly in action and

spirits were positive. Some staff had difficult journeys to school and I must pay great tribute to them for their valiant efforts. Our canteen staff were magnificent in ensuring that a good service was provided throughout the four days.

During this time, year 6 parents received their **secondary school choices** and we learned that we are **heavily oversubscribed** for September 2018. It is humbling to have so many families putting us as their first choice and wonderful that the local community has such faith in us. This means that we will be **full in years 7 to 10** next year and hopefully our sixth form will continue to gain healthy numbers between **350 and 400**. This all contributes markedly to **stability** which is so important.



As always, we share the disappointment with those who did not secure a place. There is always some movement between March and September (for example, when families with places move out of the area) so the situation is not yet final. Our long waiting list for places in the current year 7 has seen students gaining places when such circumstances occur.

Parents will be aware that we distribute

surveys at all parents' evenings to keep us in touch with parental opinion of the school. The comments made are also very helpful.

Some year 10s escaped the poor East Grinstead weather by travelling to Berlin where the temperatures were actually 12 degrees below freezing!



This did not dampen students' interest in this fascinating city. They visited the **Brandenburg Gate**, a key crossing between the east and west of the city during the cold war, as well as the 1936 **Olympic Stadium**. The visit also took in other iconic Berlin landmarks such as **Checkpoint Charlie**, the **Bundestag**, the **Holocaust Memorial** and the **Sachsenhausen Concentration Camp Memorial**, bringing history vividly to life and offering fresh perspectives on the story of the twentieth century.



During half term, our **Beliefs and Values department** organised a moving trip to **Krakow** in Poland, which included a visit to the

Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp. Having made this trip myself with sixth form students in the past, I would certainly describe it as profoundly life changing.



Students also visited the nearby
Wieliczka Salt Mine, an enormous
underground complex where once Jews
were corralled to work in a subterranean
armaments factory. The mine is



internationally famous for what has become known as **the Underground Salt Cathedral of Poland**, built by the miners in medieval times as a place to worship before going about their dangerous work. The cathedral is carved out of the salt, and everything within it is made from the mined material. Even the chandeliers are made of specially treated salt.

Such trips offer such a broadening of horizons and I am deeply grateful to the **staff who give up their time so readily** in both organising and accompanying them.

On a similar note, our **geography department year 12 field trip to Pembrokeshire in Wales** went ahead last week despite the weather, albeit departing one day later than planned. Once again, the **staff showed both resilience and flexibility** in avoiding cancellation and ensuring that this valuable and important experience took place.



On the journey there, students undertook some human geography fieldwork in Port Talbot, looking at the impact of globalisation on what is essentially a single-industry town. In Pembrokeshire, activities included heading off to the dune system at the beautiful Freshwater West beach (famous for being the location for the burial of Dobby in Harry Potter), to find fresh erosion that had resulted from the recent storm surges and spring tides. Here they undertook their dune transects and applied statistical analysis to their findings.





You might have thought that we were suffering from an excess of challenge in snowy conditions, but spare a thought for year 12 student Ollie Roberts, who was aiming to raise money for Teenage Cancer Trust by trekking to Everest Base Camp. I am delighted to share that Ollie arrived there safely; he is second from left at the front in this picture. The biggest challenge was the lack of oxygen as the party climbed above 5000 metres. At such heights there is less than half the oxygen than at sea level, and together with the strenuous demands of ascending to such altitudes this made a gruelling expedition.




