E-safety with Mr Lea

This month Mr Lea has got some advice on 'Snapchat', the app which sometimes seems to rule a teenager's life!

Reporting on snapchat

Snapchat is a hugely popular messaging app that allows users to share photos, texts and videos, ie 'Snaps'. In this article we are looking to answer some of the most frequently asked questions about reporting on Snapchat.

How do I make a report?

Snapchat have some <u>really easy guidance to reporting content within their app</u>, this <u>link</u> covers how to report a story, a snap you've received, an account and content from advertisers or publishers.

What happens when you make a report?

When you make a report on Snapchat, it is sent to the moderators at Snapchat to review. They will view the reported snap or account and decide if the content breaks the community guidelines. If it does break these guidelines the account/snap will be removed from the platform, and if the content is illegal Snapchat may notify law enforcement.

Who can see that you have made the report?

All reporting on Snapchat is anonymous. The person you report is not able to see that you have reported them, even if the report results in their content or account being removed.

What if you report by accident?

As each report is moderated by the team at Snapchat if you report something that does not break their community guidelines then no action will be taken.

Will the post get deleted?

If a post breaks Snapchat's community guidelines then Snapchat have the right to delete the content, and if they deem it necessary then can also suspend or delete the account.

What breaks the community guidelines of Snapchat?

The full community guidelines can be <u>found on Snapchat's website</u>. These include:

• Adult Content (eg pornographic content)

 Nudity or Sexually Suggestive Content Involving Minors

- Illegal Content
- Invasions of Privacy
- Threats & Violence
- Harassment & Bullying

- Impersonation
- Hate Speech
- Terrorism
- Spam

They earned a place after claiming the runners up prize at the regional event in June. The two boys were being judged on their project "Investigating resonance and its implications" by a panel of expert judges, along with around 200 other entries.

Their project has developed since the summer by modelling how buildings shake during earthquakes. They also met science and engineering professionals from major UK and global organisations. Their presentations were fluent and detailed, and although they did not claim any new prizes, it was a great experience.

News from Science

Science Week 2018

This term saw Sackville organising a host of events to coincide with British Science Week (9th – 18th March). Throughout Sackville, all of our science classes in Y7, Y8, Y9 and Y10 took part in a Science Week lesson. This lesson was shaped by the theme for BSW this year, which was 'Exploration and Discovery'. We decided to focus the lesson on extending students' understanding and

appreciation of how science has shaped the world around us. It encouraged our young people to think about everyday scientific discoveries from past and present, and how they have affected their daily lives.

Each class was set the task to research the most important scientific discoveries that have taken place in one of four categories, and they then submitted their findings for the chance to win a class prize. The standard and range of submissions made, especially with only a limited time to complete, was a credit to our students and has made judging them quite challenging. The winners will be announced at the start of next term.

In addition to this, Sackville science teachers hosted a session at Meads Primary School to celebrate Science Week. Here, Mr Delahunt and I took the Y5's and Y6's through a session describing the importance of discoveries made in space - and linked it to how light is not just the white that they see around them. The students were able to create Newton wheels to take home with them that day. Their knowledge about space and their enthusiasm was fantastic, and it makes it even more exciting that many of the Y6's in the group are thrilled and eager to be joining Sackville in September. I'm excited for them to bring their enthusiasm and inquisitive natures with them.

Women in engineering

Last Tuesday we received a talk from a young female engineer, Maira Bana. This was presented to girls in years 9 to 11 and helped to give us a better idea of girls in engineering. I enjoyed the talk as it included the subjects I love and encouraged me to push for what I'd like to continue with at university or as a career. We were able to talk one on one with Maira which gave us an even greater depth on how to come from a minority and make ourselves equals. I'd like to think that the talk can influence many females to combat stereotypes and work for what they want.

Maira is a STEM ambassador who are professionals working in STEM careers who volunteer their time to help inspire students. It was fantastic to see the girls get some advice about a field (mechanical engineering) that is currently predominantly male dominated.

Mars talk with Prof Andrew Coates

On Friday 9th of March, five Sackville students were lucky enough to visit Brambletye school and listen to a university professor, Andrew Coates, give a lecture on Mars, and the probability of life around 3.6 billion years ago. He showed us a CPU created photo of what they thought it would look like all that time ago.

He also told us about two other planets that are suitable to hold life on them, and why they were suitable for a possible lifeform to survive on its supporting terrain.

The professor also told us about future missions that many European nations are working together on. This is so that Mars can be explored fully, and to see if the world can progress in its studies to search for life on other planets, in our solar system and beyond.

Professor Coates also has a big role in one particular mission in the future, as him and his team are in charge of designing the camera that is going to be placed on a rover for the mission in 2020. He showed us all the specific parts to this rover, including the examination box and the 2m deep drill, mounted on the side of the rover's outer body.

My final stops will be in Sri Lanka and then Dubai before returning home at the end of a great trip. I can't recommend enough for anyone who wants to travel to do so; learning doesn't stop when you leave



school! I hope to see some old colleagues and students this summer term for a brief catch up, so do come and say hello if you see me around, but until then good luck for everyone in their exams this summer!
