## Department of Health & Social Care

With the present levels of anxiety nationally, I feel it is only right to commence this issue of Sackville News with reference to the challenging Coronavirus situation.

I would like to reassure everyone that, alongside all West Sussex schools, we are carefully following the government guidelines on dealing with the coronavirus, and receive updates on a daily basis. Current advice remains that schools should remain open as normal. We are aware of the possibility of some disruption as the government response enters the 'delay' stage, and are planning to ensure that learning and assessment continues in the optimum way possible should such disruption occur. We will keep in close touch via email of any further developments. Thank you.

Since the half term break, our year 11s have sat their second set of mock examinations this year over a two week period and their approach throughout was excellent. I could not have been more proud of them and would like to take this opportunity to thank you, the parents, for all of your unfailing support. The final GCSE year is challenging and we are absolutely committed to helping our young people achieve their very best through standing beside them the whole way. Our second parents' evening with subject teachers is held next week, a schedule of Easter holiday revision classes is currently being put together and an exams preparation evening will be held at the end of April at which the individualised summer timetables for the students will be explained.

Our sixth form students are also preparing hard and this year we have further refined our support and monitoring process following their mock examination outcomes. They are an impressive year group!

I can now report to everyone that the school is once again heavily oversubscribed with first preference choices from year 6 parents for entry to year 7 in September 2020 following admissions letters being sent to parents on 1<sup>st</sup> March. This is a **significant vote of confidence for the school** from the local community for which we are very grateful. We are also conscious that there are many disappointed families at the current time; it is likely that the local authority will hold appeals for Sackville places in June.



The year 10 history visit to Berlin can be a pivotal moment in the GCSE course, as students see first-hand the historical places which play such a large part in the Germany component of the course. Sights visited this year included the Bundestag, the Holocaust Memorial, the Story of Berlin Museum, the Sachsenhausen concentration camp, Checkpoint Charlie and the Topography of Terror. It's a packed, informative and very moving itinerary, but one which makes the subject come alive. I am



very grateful to Alison Vance, Hayley Garrison, Laura McLeod, Sophie Odell and Neil Feist for organising the visit and accompanying the students.

## Sackville debaters

#### Ms Wernham writes:-

On Thursday 27<sup>th</sup> February the formidable year 13 debate team visited nearby Lingfield College to take part in the MACE South East Regional Finals. The competition was fierce involving five other schools (St. Edmunds School, Brighton College, Sevenoaks School, The King's School, Canterbury and Lancing College) debating a range of topics including: *This house would introduce a Universal Basic Income* and *This house believes that tech companies must hand over users' personal data to law enforcement agencies if requested to do so.* 

Pitched against Lancing College, our superb team of **Imogen Gaines**, **Ellie Smith** and **Aminah Rahman**, spoke for the opposition on the motion: *This house would abolish the House of Lords.* The speakers delivered engaging arguments, offered on the spot rebuttals to Lancing College's interjections and summed up with a strong finish.



The girls worked incredibly well as a team and were commended for their polite debate style, use of humour and excellently structured speeches – skills honed under the expert guidance of Mrs Stuart.

The judges took a long time to deliberate and only one team could go through to the national finals in London in March. Brighton College were the overall winners of the night but our Sackville team were highly praised by the judges and given very positive feedback as well as some constructive points to focus on in future. As the only state school left in the competition we think they did an outstanding job and are extremely proud of them – well done Team Sackville!

## **Intermediate Maths Challenge**

We'd like to offer our congratulations to **Matthew Botten** in year 10, who has qualified for the **Hamilton Olympiad**, open to the best 600 mathematicians up to the age of 16. He also took part in the **Senior Maths Challenge**, open to sixth-formers as well. Here he writes about his experience in the challenge.

The UK Maths Trust (UKMT) Senior Maths Challenge (SMC) is open to all students under the age of 18 in the UK (Year 13). The SMC is a series of questions that increase in difficulty and are made to be challenging and to stretch the most able students.

The paper consists of 25 multiple choice questions and you have 90 minutes to answer as many as you can. Everyone starts with 25 points and a further 4 points are added for each correct answer and 1 point is deducted for each incorrect answer (excluding answers left blank). Consequently the maximum mark is 125 and the minimum is 0.



The questions were very challenging- here is one of the latter questions:

<b>21.</b> In a square garden <i>PQRT</i> of side 10 m, a ladybird sets off from <i>Q</i> and moves along edge <i>QR</i> at 30 cm per minute. At the same time, a spider sets off from <i>R</i> and moves along edge <i>RT</i> at 40 cm per minute. What will be the shortest distance between them, in metres?

In the SMC I got a result of 88, I am very proud of this result as I am only 14 (Year 10). In the SMC the 2019 thresholds for certificates were: Bronze - 49; Silver - 61; Gold - 76. As a result I have earned 3 certificates: Gold, Best in Year and Best in School!

The people who do well in the SMC (score over76) qualify for the Senior Kangaroo and three people from Sackville qualified. This consists of 20 questions in 60 minutes with 5 points per correct answer starting at 0 points. These questions are even more challenging and all the answers are 3 digit numbers ranging from 000 to 999 with no multiple choice. I am very pleased with my result of 35 which means I was in the top 40% of people who qualified for the SMC nationally along with Luke Waddell in Year 12 who got the same score.

Anyone fancy a go at that question? Well done Matthew.
