Dear Parents and Carers

One of the great pleasures of the job of headteacher is being able to walk around the school and see so much high quality learning going on. Every time I do, I am struck by the **calm and industrious atmosphere in our classrooms**.

At the end of yet another unprecedented term, I am more than ever impressed by this, and thankful for it. Only three weeks ago we all returned to the school buildings, often to find their rooms decorated for Christmas as they were left in December.

The last four weeks have seen enormous levels of activity. We have **tested of our students and staff for COVID**, and ensured students have enough **home testing kits** to use. We have continued **to recover our IT systems** from a ransomware attack which we have since found out we were far from unique in suffering. We have run a programme of **HPV injections for years 8, 9 and 10**. We have delivered **options information to our year 8 students**, and their choices have successfully been input online. Our subject **leaders** have been working double-time to lead our exam years towards their **final assessments in May**, whilst our **exams officers** have busily put an exam timetable together often as advice from the government changes around them. Our **canteen** has been busy serving food, though not as much as we would all like just yet – another ransomware casualty. Our **site staff** have worked endlessly to keep the school **COVID secure**.

Most of all though, our students have returned energised and keen to study. They have worked closely with their

teachers over the last few weeks to show just how much progress they made over the last lockdown. As the spring weather arrives, we can look forward to the rest of the year in confidence.

With the return of the students, our Wednesday lunchtime concerts have resumed. It is wonderful to see the talent on display, and I know it is not just my mood that is lifted. In this picture you can see **Seren Foulds, Ollie Tomkinson** and **Joe Boyle** supported by our own Mr Hoelters.



This week, Mr Endersby, Mr Jones and Mr Street have held celebration teas with those year 7s whose attitude to learning has shown the most improvement since the first set of monitoring grades. You can see Connor Beard receiving his award from Mr Street with that very 2021 'handshake'. After a photo in the spring sunshine, the students were treated to a biscuit and fruit juice. Well done to all of the hardworking year 7s!

INSET days

The school closure has of course meant changes to our school calendar. We want to give you plenty of notice of our next two INSET days, which will be on **Thursday 27**th **and Friday 28**th **of May**. These are our second and third INSET days this year, and the week after is half-term.

COVID home testing

Mr Bush writes:-

Students were issued with new boxes of Covid-19 home-testing kits last week. Testing should continue every Sunday and Wednesday for the rest of term and **throughout the Easter holidays** so that mass testing will not be required on return. Anyone who has not received a kit can collect one from their form tutor or year office. Further kits will be issued when students return after Easter.

If someone in your household has symptoms of Covid-19, everyone in the household must self-isolate and book a PCR test at a test centre, or order one by post. You must NOT use the lateral flow test kits issued by school as a way of 'ruling out' Covid if someone has symptoms as they are only for detecting asymptomatic cases only.

Frequently asked questions

Why are students being asked to complete tests at home?

Almost all students completed lateral flow tests (LFTs) for Covid-19 in school in early March to check for those carrying the virus but with no symptoms. Now students have learned how to take a swab, testing is to be completed at home. This reduces the risk of transmission into school.

If someone in the household has symptoms, everyone must self-isolate and book a PCR test. Do NOT use these tests as a way of 'ruling out' Covid; they are only for detecting asymptomatic cases.

Who should take a test?

All students should take a test if a parent consents to doing so. However, if the student has tested positive for Covid-19 in the last 90 days from a PCR test need **not** be tested, as they may generate a 'false positive' result. They should wait until the 90 days have expired and then begin testing from day 91.

Where do we get test kits from?

Students are issued with kits as they arrive into school. If you cannot find the tests, or have run out, please contact the year team for a replacement.

When do students need to test?

Students should be tested every Sunday and Wednesday until further notice.

Do I need to supervise my child to take the test?

Students under the age of 16 require supervision for the test and reporting of the result

Once I have the result, who do I need to tell?

All results (negative and positive) must be reported to the **NHS Test & Trace website**. Full details are given in the instructions so please follow them carefully.

Are testing kits available for the rest of the household?

Rapid testing is now also available for **parents, their households and support or childcare bubbles.** The government is encouraging all families to participate in twice weekly testing to help stop the spread.

School Uniform

We fully appreciate that school uniform has been more difficult to purchase during the lockdown period and that many students have demonstrated their individuality with regards to haircuts and colour. I would appreciate that parents assist students in addressing issues regarding uniform and appearance over the Easter period so they can return to school ready to learn and following our uniform guidelines.

It is also worth noting that as the weather improves in the summer term students will no longer be permitted to wear coats / non-Sackville jumpers in classrooms.

In addition to the above it is also worth noting that:

No jewellery is acceptable other than a wrist watch and a set of plain stud earrings. Any other piercings of
any kind will be asked to be removed.
Shirts must be worn tucked in.
Nail varnish and acrylic nails are not permitted.
Extreme haircuts and colours are not permitted. Grade 2 or below and tram lines of any description are not
allowed. For girls hair colour must be natural and dip dyes are not acceptable.
Make up by girls in year 9 or above must be discreet, particularly eye make-up.

At Sackville we believe that 'Together we Achieve' and parents can support the school in educating students in how best to behave in a respectful, responsible and appropriate way, ensuring all students uphold our high expectations.
