**Dear Parents and Carers** 

I have to start this week by thanking our exam students for the fantastic attitude they have shown through the first week of assessments. These young people have faced some uncertainty since Christmas, but have dealt with it exceptionally well, and seeing how well prepared they are for these final assessments fills me with optimism about the grades they are going to achieve. I would like to give a special mention for year 10 here, who have sat their first formal assessment in the sports hall this week. Their attitude and preparation have been commendable.

None of this could happen without the work of our **exams office**, who are doing more than twice the work of a usual summer, running our own internal assessments as well as administering the official exam season and entering more than four-thousand data items into the exam boards' databases.





A school is always a busy place of

course, but this summer has seen additional activity as we maintain the fabric of the school and keep it fit for many future school year groups. The **new windows on our top gym and art block** make the building look good as new. No more rattling when the wind blows!

This *Sackville News* comes out on a Wednesday because we wanted to make clear that we will soon be following the **new government guidance about the wearing** of masks in schools. From Monday May 17<sup>th</sup>, masks are no longer required for

**students in school**, though they are still expected when travelling to and from school by bus. Of course, should students feel more comfortable wearing them they are free to do so.

Overall, the national announcements on Monday show what a good position the country is in. We therefore now have some latitude to change the way we operate. After half-term, with the departure of years 11 and 13, we are going to 'de-zone' the school. Whilst students will still be taught in single year group classes (year 'bubbles') they will once again move around the school and be able to use the specialist classrooms in drama, music, technology and science. Students will be issued with new timetables during the last week of this half term.



In the last edition of *Sackville News* Mr Endersby wrote about the fundraising weekend for **Annie Dilek** and **Andrew Smith**, two of our former students who were sadly lost to cancer.

Second prize went to Mrs Thomson from finance, for the gorgeous cream and fruit sponge. Mrs Thomson's daughter Jade was one of Annie's closest friends. On Saturday it was the turn of **Mr Endersby** to run a marathon on the south Devon coast, and over the weekend many staff took part in another Sackville **virtual relay** whilst others

I also have news of more fundraising for another extremely good cause. Readers of *Sackville News* will know **Jamie Young** successfully finished treatment for cancer a couple of years ago. Alongside some of his friends he wants to

raise some money for **Teenage Cancer Trust**, a charity that supported him and his family during his treatment. His idea is for his Saturday football team, **Forest Row U16s**, to take on an elite **Sackville staff invitation 11**.

The match will take place at 6.30pm on Thursday May 27<sup>th</sup>. Players will all donate £5 and there will be raffles and collections for spectators. Please come and show your support; the staff are going to need it, as Jamie's team have just won their league!
