
Dear Parents,

The autumn term is a lengthy stretch of the school year where it is important that good momentum is maintained in learning. Added to this, we have our usual Sackville plethora of opportunities for many to enjoy as the festive season approaches!



As the **centenary of Armistice Day** approached, our **librarian Mrs Rose** looked at the topic of remembrance and the First World War with all of our year 7 classes and is seen here in front of our **silhouette soldier**, signed by everyone with a relative who fought in the Great War. Poppies were also signed and this was displayed in Reception in November. I ran a series of **remembrance assemblies** which focused on showing respect for those who

made the ultimate sacrifice as well as on how the world would be a better place if we all work together. The real climax to all of this was the



creation of a **giant human poppy** on the playground by the whole community on Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> November. This was a remarkable achievement, with some **1600 people** involved. It was the brainchild of **Mr Feist** and was, of course, very well supported by **Mr Latus** who commented, "We are not just asking people to buy a poppy, we are asking them to be the poppy". The images soon spread far and wide, including to the **BBC** who managed to mix us up with the other Sackville in Kent! On Friday 9<sup>th</sup> November, **2 minutes silence** was observed by all as the poppy image was revealed on classroom screens. It was incredibly moving.

Toby Castle, year 10, was

the youngest member of the British Legion to go to Ypres in August this year as part of the pilgrimage to lay a wreath at the Menin Gate. He also participated in the Royal British Legion Festival of Remembrance at the Royal Albert Hall on Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> November where he spoke about his great, great, great uncle Martin O'Connor who was gassed on the Western Front. He commented, "For me going through what the soldiers did by making a pilgrimage to the trenches brought it alive. Now doing this as a school, it makes everyone part of one thing, one big thing, and it should unite the school in respect for those who died for our country".





On **Remembrance Sunday** itself, I accompanied our Head Girl Grace de Souza and Head Boy Will Roberts-Percy to the **East Grinstead Remembrance Parade** to lay a wreath on behalf of the Sackville community.

It is always a pleasure to welcome parents to the school and particularly so when it is the first consultation evening in a child's secondary school career. Our '10 weeks in' evening was very well attended and parents were looked after by our sixth formers who were pleased to serve refreshments at the event. We also ran sessions explaining how our Key Stage 3 'K steps' assessment system works and also a workshop on esafety which parents hopefully found helpful. I would like to thank Mr

**Thompson**, **Mrs Farrant** and all of the year 7 tutors for their hard work in ensuring that this was such a productive and positive evening.

Since the last edition of Sackville News we have also hosted our **sixth form open evening** where we experienced a pleasingly high turnout. Many students reported being spoilt for choice with the **number of courses** that we offer and it was good to see so many young people **come along from other schools** to have a look at us. As usual, our students did us proud by supporting department stalls and giving great speeches about the sixth form experience at Sackville.

On top of considering sixth form choices, our year 11 students have now begun their **mock examinations** with English Language last Friday and the rest following soon. The outcomes should provide helpful indicators for progress after Christmas. **The best of luck to all of them!** 



On Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> November, whilst a large contingent of Sackville students was taken to the **England v. The Juniors made it through to the **4 x 50m finals** and **came 6<sup>th</sup>** which was magnificent!

On Tuesday evening, Imogen Gaines and Aminah Rahman were successful at the English Speaking Union Debating Competition, hosted at Burgess Hill School for Girls. The judges commended them on their 'poise, delivery style and humour' as they opposed the motion from Brighton College that 'This house would weight votes such that the younger the voter, the more powerful their vote.' how capable he is, scoring two baskets in two shots.




After school **Endersby's All-Star Year 8 Tutor Team** took on **Street's All-Comers**. Andrew's year team did him proud, winning the game 23-8.

They also promoted the **role of women in science and engineering**, challenging what can be a stereotypical view of an engineer. Throughout the day, the engineers visited lessons showing how the skills learned in science and maths are clearly needed in the world of work.

Joe, pictured on the far left of this montage, is **graduate materials engineer** currently working on **Hinkley Point C Power Station**. We would like to thank the team for giving up a day and helping us meet one of our careers' 'Gatsby benchmarks', encounters with employers and employees.



This week has seen four Sackville students sweep the board at the **Meridian Rotary Young Chef competition** held at Imberhorne School. **Isabella Collins** was the overall winner, and you can see her sumptious creation in this picture. **Hannah Plumb** was second, **Ciara Humphrey** third, with **Scott Humphrey** runner up. The judges were extremely complimentary of the work of the

## **UCAS** applications

A significant proportion of our year 13 students are now submitting their UCAS forms for places at university in September 2019. We are thrilled once again to welcome a team of UCAS advisors from the University of Sussex. This team comes in regularly and gives one to one support for students on their applications and personal statements. The feedback from our students on this level of individualised help is overwhelmingly positive. Thank you to Sussex University for such a great service. We are proud of our links with this prestigious university and grateful for the support they offer us.



## **Extended Project Qualification (EPQ)**

This year we launched our EPQ programme for students. Students are expected on this 12 month course to explore and research a topic of interest to them and present a 5000 word project essay or design an artefact and produce a 2000 word write up of the artefact. The EPQ is recognised and liked by universities and in most cases it leads to lower university offers.

As this qualification is linked to many skills needed at university, such as research and referencing skills and presentation skills, our local universities are in a position to provide much support for us. We have been particularly fortunate to forge contacts




with Dr Emma Thompson at University of Southampton. Not only did she invite staff to an EPQ at a conference in June 2018 at Southampton University, she also followed this up with visits to Sackville both to launch the EPQ and this week, to run individual tutorials to over 40 students on their EPQ topics. The staff EPQ supervisors also attended these interviews.

We would like to thank Emma very much for the high quality tutorials she ran, perfectly pitched at extending and stretching our A level and Btec students. This individual interview experience not only furthered the project ideas for our students but it also gave the students unparalleled access to university style interviews and tutorials. Emma will be back in the spring time to listen to some project presentations. Thank you to Emma and University of Southampton for their generous input on this new area of study for us.

## **Reports from Miss Offler**


### **U12 Football League Match**

### The Secondary Schools Team Swimming Relay Championships

This year our junior and intermediate boys qualified for the National Swimming Finals after their excellent performances in the qualifying gala which was held at Horsham Pavilions at the start of October. The finals were held at the **London Aquatics Centre** on Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> November. The Championships is run as a national final with competing schools determined by the fastest times achieved in a qualifying round organised by the ESSA divisions. There were just over 150 separate schools who qualified for the National Finals this year. Teams travelled to London from all over the country. We were immensely proud of both of our teams for having qualified for this event. The junior team qualified for both the medley and freestyle relays whilst the intermediate team qualified for the medley relay.

The morning session saw both teams competing in their medley relays. The junior boys came 19<sup>th</sup> with a time of 2.20.08 whilst the intermediate boys came 30<sup>th</sup> in a time of 2.09.90. The afternoon saw even more excitement with the junior boys' freestyle relay. The boys swam a brilliant heat which gave them a qualifying time for the final where the top 10 qualifying teams competed. A great performance in the final resulted in a time of 2.01.26 and coming 6<sup>th</sup> overall. It was not only an excellent performance but also a fantastic improvement having originally qualified in 9<sup>th</sup> position for this event.

Both teams were competing against the very best school teams in the country, and so these results represent a truly fantastic achievement.

We would like to thank the students for their impressive efforts and their parents for transporting and supporting them.
