Dear Parents

As we move deeper into the year, the school has become its usual hive of activity!

We have shown a **very large number of families** around the school during our **open mornings**, with extra slots created to meet demand. Without exception, visitors commented on how **quiet and purposeful** the school was when in session. **The quality of teaching and learning** is without a doubt impressive and a real tribute to the staff and students.

Last Friday, on behalf of the school, I attended the **funeral of Michael Leppard at St. Swithun's Church**. Many parents who attended Sackville may well have been taught by Michael, who was **Head of Divinity**. His devotion to teaching and to the town he loved came across very strongly in the tributes to him and the service was well attended.



The government has confirmed how well our year 11 students performed last year with the first release of its **2019 performance tables**. These show we have achieved the much sought-after '**above average'** green classification.

This is based on our '**Progress 8**' score of **+0.31**, showing that **one in every three** 

**GCSE grades last summer were a full grade higher** than those achieved by similar students in other schools.

We knew how hard our 16 year-olds worked last year; we are delighted to see this confirmed by these official figures which show **Sackville standing out strongly in the locality**.

Congratulations to our head boy Ayo Odeyinde, who was named Young Volunteer of the Year at the Mid-Sussex Applauds Reception at Eastcourt on Sunday October 13th.

The judges were impressed by Ayo's many volunteering exploits. During the last summer holidays he arranged a **sports summer club**, obtaining all of the necessary permissions, arranging for DBS checks for helpers and securing funding. Twenty primary school aged students each day had their holidays enormously enhanced by his efforts.



Ayo regularly volunteers as a **sports leader at Estcots Primary School**, offers his services to the **Welcome Cafe at Trinity Methodist Church** and also accompanies members of his scout troop to **Charters Retirement Village** to support residents there.

Well done indeed Ayo – all this and still time to play a key role in our sporting endeavours, including the annual Sackville-Imberhorne Memorial Game.

Thank-you also to **Mr Heatley**, **Seren Foulds**, **Toulah Morgan** (pictured), **Jamie Bland**, **Alexandra Cumpatescu**, **Saskia Crumpton** and **Chloe Harman** who gave up their Sunday afternoon to play some wonderful music at the event.

this article, I am also pleased to report that our Head Girl, Lily Kendrick, has also been extremely busy! She writes:-

"In my new role as part of the **Student Leadership Impact Group** I have a responsibility for promoting Sackville's charity work. We've had a fantastic start to the Charity Group this year in collaborating with other schools in the community in support of the organisation '**Movement on the Ground**' that is providing essential humanitarian aid for **Greek refugee camps**. It's been a whole school effort to collect tents, blankets and other winter essentials to donate some relief for the many people arriving in the Greek islands of **Lesbos** and **Samos**.





The main camp was originally designed to hold 2000 people but currently there are **11,000 people there** with more arriving every day. At present, the weather is still warm and the situation is less critical, but in the coming months the weather will deteriorate providing many more challenges for the people living there, especially because the camp has already run out of many basic supplies.

We've been delighted with the cooperation and generosity of everyone in the school in collecting **well over the expected amount**; six big car fulls for their **Winterisation programme**. Thank you to everyone who came together, what a wonderful turnout for a wonderful cause! A big thank you also to **Stine Degmeier-Douch** for introducing us to this organisation!"

Thank you to Mrs Stuart for taking students **from years 10, 12 and 13** to **Cambridge University** to get some public speaking training from Cambridge debaters as well as a visit to the **Fitzwilliam Museum**. The debating itself took place at the **Cambridge Union** where speakers were judged by none other than **Judge Judy**. Well done to all of those who took part – you did yourselves and Sackville proud.

# Student leadership at Sackville

We are reviewing the way **student leadership** works across the whole school.

We know here at Sackville how crucial gaining leadership skills and experience is in allowing students and young people to flourish when they leave school. We are told by parents and businesses in our local community that they want young people entering the next stage of their lives after school education, whether into employment, apprenticeships or higher education, to have gained real leadership experience.

INVOLVE

The vision of student leadership here at Sackville is

- □ to allow students to get involved in extracurricular clubs
- □ to take a more leading role inside or outside the classroom, and finally
- □ to make an impact to the wider school community.

Getting involved and leading others is something that we know our students are not only keen to do, but are really good at.

**Making an impact** is where I believe we can really develop opportunities for our young people. We are doing this by creating IMPACT groups across five areas that allow our students to choose to get involved in what interests them.

The groups are as shown in the graphic on the right.

Our **sixth form head team**, along with the support from some members of staff, will be chairing each group, but we are hoping for students from across all year groups to play a vital role in delivering some of the work that these groups will be doing throughout the year.

Already work carried out by these groups includes the collecting of clothing for humanitarian relief in Greece.

Future opportunities include; tree planting, crisp packet recycling, mentoring of students and support work in the local community.

# **Arkwright Scholarship**

**Luke Waddell**, our current Arkwright scholar, has learnt that he is being sponsored under this scheme by The Reece Foundation. This is a charity that promotes manufacturing and supports education particularly relating to engineering, maths and physics. The Foundation was set up by Dr Alan Reece, a highly-successful and entrepreneurial engineer who passed away in 2012.

Dr Reece owned and ran the Reece Group of Companies, one of the best-performing industrial groups in the north-east of England. One of the Reece Group of companies, Pearson Engineering Ltd, specialises in the design and manufacture of combat engineering and de-mining equipment that people's lives and missions depend on. It

also provides industrial deep-water mining and excavation systems.
