### Dear Parents,

Welcome back to everyone. I do hope you have had a good summer and we look forward to another fruitful year ahead. I would like to begin by thanking the many people who have worked so hard over the past six weeks in **preparing the premises** 



for our return; they have done a fine job!

I would also like to offer a very warm welcome to our new year 7 students and their families. We are really looking forward to working in partnership with you over what will be, I am sure, many happy and successful years.

Our students have once again done themselves proud with this summer's examination results.

In a year when many new, more challenging qualifications were examined for the first time, an amazing **30% of the school's A level and Technical grades were at the highest levels of A or A\*** with **over half at grade B or higher**. With a 99% pass rate overall, 43% of students achieved at least one A grade. In maths alone, **26 grades were at A or A\***.



Parents may recall that our 2016 results placed us top in West Sussex for GCSE to A level progress, so it is great to see real continuity in performance here.

Particular congratulations go to the following 10 students who impressively achieved straight A/A\*s: Hannah Carney, Anna Davison, Lucas Day, Joe de Souza, Francesca Higginson, Ciara Nightingale, Joe Roberts-Percy, Hannah Seymour, Ben de Turris and Adam Woods. Many congratulations also to Harry Holmes, Amy Kilner and Angus Kirk who achieved two starred distinction grades in their technical qualifications.



At GCSE, we are also delighted with the achievement of our students in their examinations. **2017 has seen significant changes to** GCSE programmes as well as a complete overhaul of the grading system in English and maths to a numerical system. The progress figure for our schools, measuring gains made by students from primary school to GCSE, is calculated based on this and is consequently not available for some time due to the new framework. Meaningful comparisons of figures from this year to last are therefore also difficult to make.



Nevertheless, the school is celebrating impressive GCSE results this summer. As a school, we have shown ourselves to be consistently high achieving with these latest results. Whilst analysis is difficult to undertake at this stage, we have certainly achieved well within the top 20% of similar schools against national targets. Three quarters of students achieved the new higher pass grade of 4 in English and in maths with 7 out of 10 of all GCSE grades being at 4+ or C+. We have also seen a narrowing in the performance gap between various cohorts of students which is encouraging. Students, parents and teachers had to cope with immense change and were both resilient and successful. Well done to all!

Sam Akehurst, Lauren Atkinson, Imogen Booth, Mark Botha, Grace de Souza, Alice Holman, Will Roberts-Percy and Ben Sweetman achieved a fantastic straight A/A\* equivalents in all of their subjects. Congratulations also to Juno Phitidis, Sophie Chapman, Caspar Parsonage, Alice Holman, Jack Sinclair, Emmie van Lieshout, Vicki Baxter, Maisie Gadd, Nuha Diaz, Katy Nice and Jenny Brockbank who achieved outstanding progress across the board: the top in their year.

A group of our **year 12 students** have returned from their month-long World Challenge trip to **China, Vietnam and Laos**. In **China**, the students trekked through the Xishuanbanna region, enjoying the scenery in the Himalayan foothills. In **Laos** they stayed in Huoy Mieng village and helped to install a water system in the village, part of a long term plan to get every household connected to the mains water supply. This work involved digging trenches and laying pipes. The students also taught an English lesson in a primary school, and enjoyed playing with the children in the local community.





This was followed by a trek through the **Laotian jungle** which necessitated careful preparation of mosquito nets each evening.

It was a fantastic expedition and the students were excellent a real credit to the school! Claudia, the World challenge leader, said that they were the



most organised team she had ever taken in all of her 10 expeditions and that they were the best team she had ever led for engaging with the local community on the project.

We are delighted to welcome back Mr Smart to the PE department following his three-year secondment at Sussex University. He returns with a wealth of relevant experience!

Our fine team of Learning Support Assistants will be augmented this year with the addition of Ms Avis, Mrs Brown-Watts and Mrs Hodge. Our Study Supervisors have also been augmented with Miss Price, Mrs Smith, Mrs Beynon and Mrs Fenwick.

Owing to the increased popularity of our canteen service that has seen numbers increase quite considerably over the last year, we have employed an extra member to Mrs Palmer's team, Miss Du Cros.

In our all-important year team structure, we have made some changes for this year, with Mrs Tingley taking over from Mrs. Stromfield as Year Leader of year 9. We have created a new role of Student Support Manager to help with the work of the year assistants and I am delighted that Mrs Shipman is taking on this role; she brings a wealth of experience and expertise to it. Mrs Knock will take over the role of Year Assistant in year 10 and Mrs Newcomb becomes Year Assistant of year 8. Mrs Brown, who oversees our transition process, will act as Year Assistant for Year 7 at the start of this term; she has the advantage of already knowing the students well from the induction process which she organised.

#### Sackville Expectations Mr Street writes:-

Welcome back, I hope everyone had a relaxing holiday and the wet British summer did not dampen your enjoyment.

It was great to see all students returning in high spirits after another good set of exam results. Year 7 looked fantastic in their new uniform and have arrived both excited and enthusiastic which is a delight to see and a real highlight of the new academic year. It is also great to see year 9 acting as buddies for the first time; they are already proving to be super role models for the new year 7.

It is important that at the beginning of the school year I outline our expectations regarding attendance. In the majority of cases we would expect students' attendance to exceed 96% as this is conducive to good learning. In line with government policy, Sackville School does not authorise holiday in term time and we would appreciate it if all parents could arrange holidays during the thirteen weeks of school holidays which are allocated to students each academic year.

As always, we are happy to work with all students and their families regarding attendance issues or concerns.

I would also like to remind students and parents of '**Give Me 5**' which we launched at the end of the summer term. 'Give Me 5' was a re-launch of our high expectations, which we have slimmed down and made simple so they are memorable to all and can be applied in a consistent manner. The poster on the next page clearly displays our five expectations and I hope you will agree these are standards that our community would want from all young people.



Sitting behind these five expectations are a clear set of positive behaviours that we expect from our students and conversely, a set of negative behaviours that we consider unacceptable.
