I would like to extend particular thanks to the year 11 team of Mr Latus,

Mrs Knock, **Mrs Rowlingson** (with them for years 7-10) and the **tutors** for leading and guiding the students so well over the past five years. Many parents will know that **Mr Latus** has decided to stand down from his role of pastoral team leader this summer after many very successful years leading groups to great heights of achievement. I am extremely pleased to report that Mr Latus will be staying on with us in his capacity as a fine teacher of geography so many more students will benefit from his skills and wisdom. His expectations are unashamedly high and, at the same time, his care for others is second to none. I think it is fair to say that a generation of Sackville students feel that they owe him a great deal.

Our **sixth formers finally complete their A levels this week** and have also approached them extremely well. Their study centre and Sackville Centre have both been hives of activity with students busily revising and seeking advice from their teachers. The sixth form **prom** is on Friday 1st July.



During the last month, the school has also picked up some **fantastic awards and prizes** for which we can all feel a great deal of pride.

At this year's **South of England Show**, Sackville very much swept the board in the prestigious **'Young Craftsman of the Year'** competition in which a large number of the region's schools, both state and private, took part. **Toby Smith** won the overall award, as well as winning the wood section. **Daniel Talbot** came runner up overall and won the metal section. **Jennifer Norton** was runner up in the textiles section and **Alex Rooke** received a special award in the textiles section. Congratulations to all

of these students and to their teachers in the design technology department for these great performances.



At the same time, we were also informed that the school had been awarded **national 'leading edge' status** for the standard of work it is doing and we have received **two national awards** for results. These are for **attainment** (the final results achieved) and **progress** (the results compared to performance on entering the school) where we are well within the top 20% of schools. For progress, we are in the top 12%. Neil Feist and I were very pleased to attend the **SSAT (Schools, Students and Teachers network) ceremony in Birmingham** to receive these awards on behalf of the school community. Well done to everybody; none of this can be achieved without strong teamwork from all. We will keep parents informed about our innovative work as a leading edge school.

Whilst focussing on awards, I am delighted to inform parents that **Helen Valentine**, our Curriculum Leader of Health and Social Care and deputy head of sixth form, has been presented with a **certificate of excellence in the National Pearson Teaching Awards 2016**. This award is very well deserved and reflects Helen's incredible dedication to the young people at Sackville. In the area of health and social care, with her fine team of staff she has transformed the provision and forged excellent links with partners in the community, such as **Chailey Heritage School**, to the great benefit of all concerned. Students following these programmes have been motivated and resilient in achieving excellent outcomes. Helen has also developed strong international links for the school including a rapidly expanding work placement programme on the continent. On behalf of everyone I would like to congratulate Helen on this fine achievement.

This summer, many **students have been taking on leadership roles** in a variety of areas. This is not only very positive for their own development but is also of great benefit to those they are working with. They have been active participants in our series of **year 5 taster days with the local primaries** which were very successful and at our **Eggsfest rehearsal** last week when our hall was packed with local primary school children and





their teachers who were all raising the roof with some hearty singing. We are all looking forward to the **open air festival on the** evening of Wednesday 13th July!

I was also delighted to see our students leading the **'Young Interpreters' Day'** when we were, once again, visited by our primary schools who took part in a workshopstyle event for youngsters for whom English is a second language. We celebrated with a breakfast and certificates in the library the following morning as the photo shows! Particular thanks must go to **Ms Williams** who has organised this so well over the past few years.

Learning is always enhanced by venturing off site and it was good to see how much our students benefited from both the **year 9** geography fieldtrip to London's docklands and the Duke of Edinburgh bronze expedition weekend. Both were in pretty poor weather conditions but the students remained enthusiastic and cheerful.





Many students also thoroughly enjoyed their **trip to Spain** in early June where they enjoyed a very much better climate than ours. They undertook a range of activities around the Barcelona area and were able to practise their Spanish frequently. I am always grateful to the staff who give up their time so generously to go on such trips. It is very much going above and beyond and gives our youngsters unforgettable experiences.

Neil Feist, Deputy Headteacher, writes:-

Amongst all of the exam preparations in Key Stages 4 and 5, this term we have continued our developments in teaching and learning. Teachers have been looking at how students can assess their own learning so that they can plan the next steps in lessons to ensure everyone continues to make good progress.

We are outward-looking and actively seek collaboration with other schools so that staff can share their best ideas and support each other's development.

This year we have played host to staff from Guildford County School in Surrey and The Marsh Academy in Kent. We are also hosting the Headteachers of Oathall School in Haywards Heath and Worthing High School who will be looking at our teaching of pupil premium and gifted and more able students. Julian Grant is now a PiXL (partners in excellence) associate and works with Ratton School in Eastbourne developing teaching and learning between the

two institutions. In addition to his role on the **Ofsted Headteacher Reference Group**, he also now serves on the **West Sussex** Secondary Headteachers' executive committee.

This term **Mr Millican** and **Mr Endersby** visited **Guildford County School** to look at their pastoral systems. They were joined by Mr Heatley who had a day there sharing ideas on the teaching of Music. Mr Bush attended the school to share best practice in Science.

Boy, by Roald Dahl


Book Review by Emmie Van Lieshout, year 10

The book is chronologically set through his life, following his experiences and his journey of growing up. A story that is memorable to me is the time that he, as a youngster, put a dead mouse in a jar of sweets in the sweet shop as revenge on the "ugly" owner. This shows the comedic side of the author, which is shown throughout his work.


The book showed other aspects to his life: the realisation of him losing loved ones and coping with the loss of his mum at a young age; growing up independently at boarding school, including the consequences of bad behaviour by getting the cane. But even though Dahl had been through bad experiences he also saw the bright side of a situation.

I really enjoyed this book as it was an insight to someone I have known and read for a long time. I recommend this book to readers age 10-12 as it is basic but funny to read, gripping and very enjoyable.



The Tell-Tale Heart, by Edgar Allan Poe

In this short story the narrator tells the story of how he committed a murder with no known motive. I find the murder to be quite mysterious because the narrator explains how he did not do it out of greed or hatred. It seems to happen with no apparent reason except for the fact the narrator appears to be infuriated by the old man's beating heart and his "vulture eyes".

The narrator tries to conceal the murder and is successful because the police never found the body. However, much like in the short story "The Black Cat", the narrator's guilt builds up. The narrator could feel the heart of the old man beating even when he was dead, this heartbeat grew louder until the beat was unbearable.

I liked how mysterious the story was and how the narrator remained unknown. I liked the use of metaphor to show how the old man's heartbeat represented the narrator's guilt.
