



Teaching and Learning developments, Spring Term 2016

Mr Feist writes:-



Our 2015 exam results and OFSTED success have drawn many schools to contact us to ask for visits to see how we have made such rapid progress. Senior staff from Guildford County School and The Marsh Academy in Kent have visited since Christmas, as ever our staff were generous with their time, and the visitors were struck by the calm and purposeful atmosphere in classrooms and around the school and the quality of teaching, marking and feedback they saw across all subjects. We will also benefit from fostering these links. We will send staff to both schools in the summer term. Music, History and teaching and learning professional development will be the focus with Guildford, Pupil Premium provision, mindfulness and pastoral systems will be the focus with The Marsh.

Our focus this term has been numeracy across the curriculum. We define numeracy as the use of number in everyday life situations. Mr Payne, as our newly appointed Director of Numeracy, has run two INSET sessions for the whole staff.

He has recognised that there are three main strands to developing this area of pedagogy; consistency in the teaching of numeracy across the Maths Faculty, consistency of numeracy teaching across all subjects and staff competency at using numeracy in their own work. To this end, his first session was a practical exploration of how staff can use and interpret the

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plethora of data that they now encounter and had some nervous teachers attempting data analysis after first working out which buttons to press on a scientific calculator! The second session demonstrated the confusion students must sometimes feel when the staff were asked to work out a multiplication problem by showing it in six different methods.

Subjects have now completed a very detailed numeracy audit and Mr Payne is collating the results to show which numeracy areas appear in what subject. He will now form a working party to agree the best way to deliver these skills consistently across all areas.

Mr Hayden led the first big teaching and learning review of the year this term. The focus was the sixth form. Over 25 lessons were observed and Curriculum Team Leaders were interviewed about their schemes of work and lesson planning whilst students were interviewed about their views on the provision they receive. The results were very positive and have given the school clear priorities for the coming year. Mr Whitehead and Mrs Valentine followed this up by holding a further sixth form training session with the whole staff this Monday where subjects decided which areas of Key Stage 5 provision they will develop in the summer term.

Our next review will be of The LINK and SEN provision across the school.

Mrs Stuart, Curriculum Team Leader of English, is leading the development of Personal Learning Checklists (PLCs) where staff and student assess progress in very fine detail with the use of online checklists and now being adapted for use across all A Level subjects. This is the pedagogical focus for next term when the PLCs will be moved from KS5 into GCSE and KS3 schemes of work.

Two INSET days this term have given staff the opportunity to work in subject areas developing their new GCSE and A level schemes of work and differentiated resources and moderate GCSE controlled assessments.

They also enjoyed an excellent session from the West Sussex Speech and Communication team on strategies for teaching autistic children. A further demonstration of our commitment to provide the best teaching and learning for every individual in our school, whatever their need.

Sixth form review

The review of the quality of 6th form provision took place beginning at the end of January. This was a comprehensive review that involved 25 detailed lesson observations by the senior leaders of the school, interviews with departmental subject leaders, an analysis of recent 6th form results and feedback from the students in terms of student questionnaire.

The findings were extremely positive with the quality of teaching rated as good or better in over 90% of the lesson observations. Students are enthusiastic about their learning and focused in lessons. They are very pleased with both the quality of teaching they are receiving and the quality of feedback they are getting to take their learning forward. Students feel that they are being well prepared for higher education. Current predictions on student achievement look very promising for the summer

Departments are working hard to make sure they that they are up to speed with the new A Level/ BTEC specifications that are coming into place although they acknowledge that writing new schemes of work and programmes of study whilst still delivering current syllabi is very challenging. This will link nicely with the implementation of Personal Learning Checklists (PLCs) for post 16 students. PLCs enable students to monitor their progress, and feedback to teachers where they perceive their strengths and weaknesses to be. We believe as a school this will be very productive in monitoring student progress throughout the year. The next subject review is looking at our Special Educational Needs provision within the school.

Supporting your child through exams

A recent article from the **Centre for Educational Neuroscience** looked at things which definitely help students learn. Some of the key findings were

- Diet makes a difference to learning. When students miss breakfast, their performance is most clearly affected when tasks are more mentally demanding, and when they involve working memory (storing and manipulating information in the short term).
- Physical exercise enhances learning. Exercise is an effective and easily implementable strategy for improving cognitive performance in children through boosting brain plasticity.
- Well-rested children do better at school. The extent to which sleep impacts on learning depends on the degree and duration of sleep deprivation and type of material being learned; but yes, well-rested children will perform better in the classroom in the short-term and the long-term.

These suggest how parents can support their children over the course of the coming exam period. All teachers will say that good sleep patterns and good diet really help students' performance. The Easter holidays are a good time to get down to revision and this will be more effective if students get good food and rest. They may of course also be less argumentative – a win-win situation!

Aerobic physical exercise also seems to be an unqualified good; regular physical activity in the Easter holiday and beyond seems a good thing, and certainly helps to break up revision which no-one would pretend to be completely pleasurable.

We have collected a number of resources on revision for students to look at here. There is a revision planner students can fill in and a number of other useful documents including the Easter revision timetable for parents which lists all of the revision classes we are putting on over the holiday.

Some students have talked very positively about the **GetRevising** site which has an online revision planner.

The final document on our site lists a number of revision hints and tips for students. There does not seem to be one perfect way of

revising for everyone so it is worth reading some of the things here. If a student does not feel the approach used so far has been

successful, try another approach. Whatever strategies adopted, most advice suggests revising in short bursts with no distraction.

Finally, it is worth saying to our year 11 students and parents that they have just been through the most stressful week of their school lives. The real exams will be much more spaced out than the mocks were and the work done already means students are already very well-prepared. Some of the Easter holiday has to be a holiday – set aside clear days when there will be no revision when it will be possible to relax. On other days don't try to cram in more than about four hours' work; it will become counterproductive. With regular breaks, four hours' work will take a lot of the day anyway.

AS physics visit to Sussex University physics department

On Friday 11th March a group of **AS physics students** and Mr Wilcox visited the **physics department of Sussex University** for the day. The visit introduced the students to some cutting edge physics as well as trying their hands at a variety of practicals. The morning began with a lecture from a researcher at the university in which he described to the students how he is capturing

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single electrons in a magnetic field to create an atom known as **Geonium** which can then be used to **detect microwaves on the quantum level** and could lead to a huge number of commercial and military applications including "Quantum Radar" for aircraft and ships.

The students were then taken on a tour or the undergraduate and postgraduate laboratories. This included being shown around a laboratory full of lasers by a PhD student whose team are working on using isolated ions to create **QBits**, which can then be used to **make Quantum Computers**. The talks were fascinating and it was inspirational to speak to experts in such cutting edge research projects. In the afternoon the students undertook a number of practical activities including measuring waves, "monkey and hunter" projectiles, turning water into "floating pearls" and failing to defuse an "alien bomb". Thank you to the staff at Sussex University for a fascinating day.

Year 12s started their visit with a Royal Shakespeare Company workshop led by one of the company's actors. He took the group through the paces of a member of the acting troupe. It was jaw dropping, tense and thought provoking as the director, Simon Godwin, has chosen to transpose the play to an African backdrop with the impressive Papa Essiedu in the lead role. Our students certainly learned from this original and energetic performance. Plenty to write about in their exam!

Year 13s who had joined the trip were treated to another mind bending RSC performance of Marlowe's *Faustus*, a tale of vanity greed and damnation. A visit to the Shakespeare Birthplace Trust took place on day two and a man bearing a striking to resemblance to the Bard guided the way. We literally walked in Shakespeare's footsteps as we toured his first home. Students had a wonderful time and were of course, exemplary! MFL trip to Madrid

On the morning of Sunday 21st February, a group of 10 A-Level students and 2 teachers set off to Madrid for a week of work experience in primary schools on the outskirts. We arrived at our glamorous hotel on the Sunday afternoon, and after some free time and a meal out, we went to bed with nervous excitement in anticipation of the start of our week long adventure.

After a very long journey to the schools, we were escorted to our separate schools and got the chance to meet our teachers. I would be helping out with 2nd and 3rd graders (7-9 year olds) throughout the week, and I got to meet my classes on the Monday. I helped in lessons such as Natural and Social Science, English and Art. All these lessons were in English, but as the kids were



relatively new to it, I had to adapt to a dialogue of both Spanish and English to help them understand. Despite my classes being somewhat rowdy, it was a very fun first day. After some free time in the afternoon, we visited the Reina Sofia art gallery, viewing famous paintings such as 'Guernica' by Pablo Picasso, and numerous works by Salvador Dalí.

On the Tuesday, I had my first experience of taking some of a lesson, as my teacher handed over to me for an exercise about telling the time. It was very embarrassing when I misread a clock and I kept telling the students they had the wrong answer, only to turn it around and realise my horrible mistake! Apart from that, the day ran smoothly and we returned back to the centre of Madrid to have this delightful all-you-can-eat buffet (FrescCo), which I would recommend if you ever end up near there. We also watched 'Hail, Caesar!' in Spanish, which unfortunately worsened the movie, but it was a still an interesting challenge to keep up and understand it.

The Wednesday was fantastic for me, as whilst many of my classmates were supervising exams, I got to visit a Spanish fire station! After a traumatically noisy coach trip there, we arrived and it was very impressive. I had never been to a fire station before so at times I was just as amazed as the kids I was supervising. The whole tour was in Spanish so it was a challenge to keep up and understand, but I managed to do it and I felt proud of my efforts. I even received a diploma and badge at the end of it. It was worth coming on the trip just for that! In the evening we visited the other famous museum in Madrid, the Museo del Prado, and it was again very interesting.

STEM visit to the Ricardo Robotics Challenge

On Tuesday the 15" of March eleven intrepid Sackville students went to Shoreham on Sea to take part in the Ricardo Robotics Challenge. We had no idea of what was in store for us, only that it might involve robots. Ricardo is a world leader in engineering and does many interesting things such as engineering internal combustion engines and global management consulting services. First we had an inspirational tour of the facilities and visited areas such as the McLaren engine production line. Then we were given one and a half hours to design and make an ant-weight robot that could both play football and wrestle. Ant weight robots are fighting robots that weigh less than 150 grams. We were provided with electric servo motors which drove and steered, cardboard, cocktail sticks, straws, bottle tops, elastic bands and sticky tape.

There were over twenty teams from several local schools, competing in the first round football matches. The best Sackville team managed to achieve a place in the final, where the best six robots fought, before being knocked out.
