During our first full week of term, we held **two sporting events** on our fields which brought the community together for very different reasons. We were delighted by the numbers of students who took part and it was great to see so many parents supporting them. Our first **year 7 parental workshop** was taking place at the same time in the English department, so many tried to attend both! The following day saw an even larger gathering on our sports fields but for a very contrasting occasion. A memorial rugby match was held in memory of ex-student Paul Keenor who tragically died in a car accident in July and it was a fitting occasion, organised by Paul's sister Poppy and Mr Currie. These events remind us about what a power for good sporting, and indeed other occasions, can be in bringing us together.



As September draws to a close, we sharpen our focus through a **teaching and learning INSET day**, annual safeguarding training and, of course, devote time to our **open evening and open mornings** when we welcome prospective parents to the school. We are both proud and excited to share our story and the quality of what we have to offer with year 5 and 6 parents and children in the locality.

Developments in teaching and learning 2015-2016Not Force Deputy Headtonber

It is my privilege to lead the development of teaching and learning at Sackville with Mr Hayden.

Over the course of last year, our teaching staff have worked together to ensure their lessons **meet the needs of all of our students**.

I was delighted that Ofsted recognised the progress we have made in our practice during their spring inspection, commenting that "teaching has improved over the last two years; **it is now consistently good**".

Our record breaking exam results are the result of a concerted effort by all subjects to ensure everyone reaches their potential. However, we are not and cannot rest on our laurels. We aspire to see everyone in school love learning and we as teachers know we can always improve what we deliver.

We continue to base our teaching on eleven **Sackville Standards** that will ensure we continue to inspire and challenge our classes.

This term we are focusing on differentiation strategies, with a particular focus on stretching our most able students.

On 25th September we are running an INSET day where all staff will attend five different teaching workshops delivered by our own staff showcasing new ideas and the latest thinking on pedagogy. The sessions will be very interactive and thought provoking and give our teachers the chance to become students for a day.

Other themes for this year include working on numeracy across the curriculum and assessment for learning using personalised learning checklists. More on these in future editions!

We also recognise that teachers in a large school can get very immersed in their own subject area and can miss seeing strategies in other subjects. Consequently, we are also running 'open door' weeks throughout the year when staff can use their non-teaching time to visit a colleague in another depart ament and see them teach. We will feed back our findings to each other at a whole staff training session. Ofsted recognised that all subjects have strong practitioners and we want to spread as much of this expertise as possible!

Ofsted said of Sackville: "Learning is often outstanding because teachers know [students] well and challenge them at just the right level". This is a huge compliment to our work so far and something we will continue to build on.

MEG is back!

Students are getting reacquainted with their MEGs as we start the new academic year. The MEG is the 'Minimum Expected Grade' for a student to achieve in a given subject. Parents might be aware we introduced the MEG two years ago, and they have helped us gain this summer's fantastic exam results.

These are set based on students' prior attainment we are relentlessly focussed in ensuring students achieve at least their MEG. Students in KS4 are also invited to set an aspirational target which is at least one grade above the MEG.

The annual staff performance management cycle is built around students achieving at least their MEGs.

These three pillars are what is building the success we are now enjoying: excellent teaching and learning, strong vision and values and a relentless desire to smoke out underachievement.

European opportunities at A level and beyond

World Challenge 2015

I think I speak for every member of the group who went on the trip when I say that world challenge Kenzania (Kenya and Tanzania) 2015 was the best experience I will ever have during my time at Sackville and it tops anything I've ever done before. There's so much to learn and appreciate about the culture of the two countries that in some aspects four weeks just isn't long enough and I know that I want to go back and explore the culture even further. From trekking alongside the Masai men and helping to build parts of a nursery school for mentally handicapped children in Kenya to planting trees at the base of Kilimanjaro and being within metres of some of the most beautiful wildlife in Tanzania, we most certainly experienced some of the most amazing culture in the world. The list of things that we got to do and take part in is endless.

The World Challenge experience lasted longer than the trip though; over two years we worked together as a team and individually to raise the money to go and for the equipment we needed together with the necessary vaccinations. Having raised the money and earned our place, it felt like the experience was even more worthwhile. Since our return people keep asking what the trip was like and I've been finding it difficult to say anything other than that the it was 'AMAZING'; there are no other words that I can find to describe it. What other opportunities does a 17 year old have to share Haribo with a Masai warrior, or play sports with children from a Kenyan slum, or enjoy a ride on a traditional Dhow off the Swahili coast of Tanzania, or to see the "Big Five"?

World Challenge is also an opportunity to learn a lot of new life skills such as communication with local people, organisation, money management but also skills such as packing a bag with a month's worth of kit before you go; learning to make sure to ANTI-BAC at every opportunity to stop yourself being susceptible to illness and learning that hygiene is so important as you don't want to get ill or make others in your group ill! We also learnt how important it is to work as a team and create a strong bond with both the other members of the team and the teachers and leaders; to appreciate the value of money as took I \$185 of personal spending money to spend on souvenirs and still managed to spend it all whilst the children on project had worn-through clothing; and finally to make sure you join in every opportunity you are given. It makes the whole trip, and life in general, a lot more enjoyable when you really try to join in with everything and give it 100%.

To finish off I'd just like to say a massive thank you to the teachers that accompanied us. Mr Wilcox, Miss Jones and Mr Johnson you were all amazing and thank you so much for this great opportunity!



Both my children have been on various school trips this term (Y8 trip to Spain, Y10 to Wales, Y8 CEW overnight camp at Blackland farm, Y10 team dynamics and the big one to Malawi).


He was then nominated by the lead coach for Sussex for the British Show Jumping Shining Star award for July which he won.
