Dear Parents,

I hope you have all had good summer breaks and enjoyed what was, for the most part, fine weather.

Firstly, I would like to extend a very warm welcome to the families of our **new year 7 students** and those **joining our sixth form from other institutions**. We are delighted to have you at our popular school and look forward to getting to know you well!



It scarcely seems possible that I am commencing my sixth year as headteacher of Sackville and I consider myself as fortunate as ever to work with such a **supportive**, **dedicated** and **dynamic community**. I am sure that we are embarking on another very fruitful and successful year.

Speaking of success, I am sure many of you will have picked up from our website, the local press or, of course, your own children the news that we have enjoyed an **excellent set of results** this summer. Once again, I would like to **heartily commend Sackville's young people** for their tremendous approach to those challenging examinations and **congratulate them** on the outcomes achieved. I have spoken on many occasions about the importance of **inclusivity and the progress of every individual** in our comprehensive school and our **shared belief** in this has once again **maximised the life chances** of our

students with fine qualifications. Of course, it is also about so much more and in this respect I am pleased to include later an article from Mr Street about our curriculum and learning experience at Sackville. We are committed to doing all we can to **support and nurture** your child and continue to **appreciate greatly your support** along the way.





At **A level and BTEC level 3**, our students had to face very different courses and examinations from those before and they more than rose to the challenge, gaining places at **several top universities** and **some excellent apprenticeships**. In terms of the all-important **progress from GCSE**, the school came in the **top 30% of schools in the country** with, for those in the know, a strong ALPS 4 score. **1 in 5** grades were at **A or A\***, **three quarters** of grades were at the higher end of **C and above** and **99% of grades** 

were passes. No fewer than 20 grades in maths were at A or A\*! 50 students achieved at least one A grade.



Top achievers included Savya Aggarwal, Oliver Blackman, Finn Purdy and Alistair Smith who all achieved straight A/A\*s, closely followed by Najwa Agmin, Matthew Cook, Andrew Huggett, Charlie Main, Sam Pelosi, Liam Rieley, Chloe Robinson, Christopher Stuart and Cameron Toogood who achieved two A/A\*s and a B.

Other students deserve congratulations for the progress made above what was expected from GCSE. Our **top value-added performers** include **Sam Pelosi, Jimmy Warwick, Ben Woodcock, Cameron Toogood, Jordi Crowther, Amy Collins, Alyx Mitchell, Sophia Ody** and **Danny Vater**. A huge well done to them and, indeed, all of our candidates.



At **GCSE**, the students **exceeded all expectations with a stunning performance!** Once again focussing on the progress, this time from entry to the school to GCSE, they have achieved a magnificent value added score which means that <u>nearly one</u> <u>in two of their grades were above government target expectations</u>! Once the data is confirmed, we expect to have performed exceptionally well nationally which is testament to the fine approach of everyone: students, staff and parents.

No fewer than **73 of our grades were at the very top grade 9** which has been widely recognised as extremely difficult to achieve. Three out of ten grades were at grade 7+ (equivalent to the old A/A\*) which is magnificent. 7 out of 10 grades were





at 4 (the old grade C) or higher which is above the national picture. Every student achieved qualifications and 99% have achieved 5 GCSE grades for the past five years: that is what we stand for at Sackville.

Again looking at government expectations, all ability groupings made better than expected progress. Boys made progress as expected and girls performed out of their skins; I am laying down a challenge here!

Very many congratulations to all of our GCSE candidates!

Results days play a very significant part in the summer break, but so also does significant improvement and maintenance work on our premises whilst the students are away. This August has been no exception and I am very pleased to report the **extensive windows replacement programme** is now complete with most of the scaffolding taken down. An excellent job has been done here as the new windows are of very high quality which improves insulation as well as the overall look of the building.

In addition to this, a lot of **decorating**, **ceiling/roof replacement** and **deep cleaning** has taken place meaning that Sackville is in very good shape to start the new school year. Our premises team have been fantastic as have the students who have been employed by us in the usual way over the past few weeks. We have also been so fortunate to gain **funding from West Sussex** for much of this work and we are grateful for their support.

We were all delighted to hear about the birth of Mrs Rogers' daughter Ivy at the start of the



holidays, not long after her commencement of maternity leave. Ivy joined us on GCSE results day so is a true Sackvillian already!

A group of sixth formers led by Mr Forsyth and Mr McMillan left at the end of July for a four week 'world challenge' expedition to Nepal. They had an amazing experience, described by one student as "the best month of my life".

With our **expanding numbers in all year groups**, we have also been able to **appoint more staff** to augment our excellent team for 2018/19. English: **Miss Godden**, who started with us in June and has recently trained at Sussex University and **Miss Salisbury** who trained with us in the recent past and will be in her second year of teaching. She joins us from the Knole Academy in Kent.

Science: **Mr Delahunt**, who has trained with us this year, **Miss Medhurst** who joins us from Imberhorne and **Dr Chatten**, who is an experienced lecturer and research scientist from Imperial College in London.

Geography: Miss Bishop, who started with us in July and has recently trained at Sussex University.

In addition to the above it is also worth noting that:

- No jewellery other than a wrist watch and a set of plain stud earrings are acceptable. Any other piercings of any kind will be asked to be removed.
- □ Shirts must be worn tucked in.
- □ Nail varnish and acrylic nails are not permitted.
- Extreme haircuts and colours are not permitted. Grade 2 or below and tram lines of any description are not allowed. For girls hair colour must be natural and dip dyes are not acceptable.
- □ Make up by girls in year 9 or above must be discreet, particularly eye make-up.

As always, I thank you for supporting us to ensure that all Sackville students can be really proud of their appearance.

# Attendance:

It is important that at the beginning of the school year I also outline our expectations regarding attendance. In the majority of cases we would expect students' attendance to exceed 96% as this is conducive to good learning. In line with government policy,

Sackville School does not authorise holiday in term time and we would appreciate it if all parents could arrange holidays during the thirteen weeks of school holidays which are allocated to students each academic year.

As always, we are happy to work with all students and their families regarding attendance issues or concerns.

## Safeguarding:

As always safeguarding remains our top priority and it is important to remind all students and parents of the school's designated safeguarding leads. **Mr Hayden** remains Sackville's Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL) and myself (**Mr Street**) the Deputy DSL. **Mrs Carter** is also a DSL and will serve as our Child Protection Officer. This is a key role in the school and for safeguarding concerns, referrals or advice she should be your first point of contact.

#### **Standards and Expectations:**


I would also like to remind students and parents of 'Give Me 5' which we launched last year. 'Give Me 5' outlines our high expectations, which we have slimmed down and made simple so they are memorable to all and can be applied in a consistent manner. The poster below clearly displays our five expectations and I hope you will agree these are standards that our community would want from all young people.



Sitting behind these five expectations are a clear set of positive behaviours that we expect from our students and conversely, a set of negative behaviours that we consider unacceptable.



Although we recognise that the vast majority of Sackville students are well behaved and respectful it is important that we have a clear system to help the minority of students to change their behaviour when required. The traffic light system below provides a hierarchy of interventions that will be applied to different behaviours. Again this clear and easy system will ensure our interventions are consistently applied; something which our students highlight as being of the upmost importance.

# **Curriculum:**

Many of you would have seen the recent media coverage with regards to the narrowing of the secondary school curriculum particularly in Years 9-11. The curriculum is something as a school we have worked particularly hard on over the last nine months and will continue to do so over the next academic year ensuring we get it right for all our students.

We were very lucky to be chosen to host an Ofsted conference at the end of the summer term which focussed on curriculum and enabled us to discuss Sackville's curriculum and share our intent which I share with you below:

At Sackville we aim to provide an engaging curriculum that allows all students to achieve their potential regardless of their ability or talents; ensuring as a school that we fight for every child. Our curriculum will provide clear progression routes which prepare students for the world of work and to live fulfilling adult lives as global citizens; leaving students with a lifelong love for learning.

Curriculum design is always a fine balance between ensuring attainment, progress and the acquisition of knowledge on one hand and a focus on cultural capital and the type of adults we want our students to be when they leave on the other.

With this in mind we encourage all students to involve themselves in our rich extra-curricular activities and learn and experience new skills that they may not study in class. We are also pleased to announce that we are offering several new courses this academic year to ensure that our curriculum is broad, appropriate and prepares all our student for a life beyond Sackville.

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All students will follow our 'Learning for Life' course during tutor time alongside a new course 'Them and Us' which is about helping young people understand the importance of demonstrating kindness, showing respect and living without harm.

In addition to this Year 9 will be starting a new non examined contemporary humanities course to ensure breadth of knowledge as student start their GCSEs. We are also working with the Anna Freud Foundation in developing a course for students promoting wellbeing. All in all I believe it is a very exciting time to be a student at Sackville.
